It is also provided in the bill that this free time off for a half holiday shall not deprive the employees of holidays or leave with pay to which they are otherwise entitled by law.

Medford post again broke all records last night when a total of 52 World war veterans were initiated into the American Legion. Although some difficulty was experienced in handling this huge class of candidates in the present legion quarters, the initiatory work was creditably put on by the officers of the post, including Commander Horace Lindzey, First Vice Commander Ted Baker, Second Vice Commander E. C. Ferguson, Past Commander Seely Hall, Acting Chaplain George Coddling and Sergeant-at-Arms Chas. Cass.

The newly decorated legion rooms presented an attractive appearance with the new lighting effects, newly tinted walls, new curtains and revised seating arrangement. A vote of thanks was extended to Chairman John Holmer and the efficient house committee for their efforts, also to the Ladies' Auxiliary for making the curtains, to Legionnaires Arthur Parker and I. E. Fox for tinting the walls and to Bill Holger of J. C. Penney & Co. for donating 54 attractive smoking stands.
