Trowbridge of the Trowbridge Lumber yard and Andy Hoffman, representing the Johns-Manville company, the chief manufacturers of asbestos products in the United States.

The speaker complimented the Men's Gospel team of this city and the men of the churches for holding such gatherings, saying on the men depends to a great measure the success of Christianity. He also paid a high compliment to the churches which are conducting the workers' training school in Medford and other cities of southern Oregon. Rev. Campbell told of the appalling ignorance of the boys and girls of today regarding God, and said it is due principally to the lack of reading and teaching the Bible in the homes. He urged all to pay more attention to religious education along all lines. He asked the men to take more time in getting acquainted with the boys on the street, making confidants of them and setting examples that inspire them to lead better lives. The speaker said that \$10,000,000,000 are spent yearly in fighting crime, that 75 per cent of the criminals are immature youths; that the average crime age had been reduced from 28 years to 18 since the last war, and that there are 85,000 homicides annually in the United States. Rev. Campbell closed by saying religion is progressing rapidly in this country, the press, the business men and people generally are realizing more than ever that they should devote part of their time in thinking and working for the cause of God and the church.

GRAND JURY BACK UPON JOB AGAIN
