

LIONS' RADIO BILL FOR BLIND, MAY 28 FEATURES FAMOUS

E. L. Scott, president of the Medford Lions club, announced this morning that the local club will cooperate in the nation-wide radio party being staged for blind people by the National Association of Lions club and to be released through a 38-station hookup by the National Broadcasting company on April 28th. The program will be in charge of John B. Kennedy, associate editor of Colliers' Weekly, as master of ceremonies, and will include Harold Bauer, pianist; Anna Case, soprano; Edwin Grasse, violinist; Milt Gross, humorist; and Irving L. Camp, president of the International Association of Lions clubs.

According to Mr. Scott, the Lions have three purposes in giving the program. "They desire to give a program of distinction to the blind people of America, numbering approximately 100,000. They desire to focus attention on the welfare of the blind people, and they desire to awaken public consciousness to the inestimable value of eyesight, and to the necessity for prevention

OUTLOOK BRIGHT, WILLYS-KNIGHT, STATE HEAD SAYS

That Medford has the true metropolitan atmosphere in her business section, was the opinion expressed yesterday by J. H. Alfred, part owner of the Alfred-Billingsley Motor company of Portland, state distributor for the Willys-Overland and Whippet, who visited Medford yesterday. Mr. Alfred arrived here yesterday morning from Klamath Falls, and spent the day conferring with George Treichler, head of the Treichler Motor company.

The Portland man expressed enthusiasm over the prospects of sales in all standard cars this year, and is especially convinced of a banner year in his own particular line of motors. The factories manufacturing Whippet and Willys-Knight cars, have now reached a production of 1753 cars a day, and have a force of 21,000 men working for them, according to Mr. Alfred, who pointed out that this fact indicated a tremendous general demand for motor cars, as well as the growing popularity of the Willys-Knight and Whippet cars.

Mr. Alfred expressed genuine enthusiasm over the manner in which the local agency is functioning.

"The dealer who sells, without regard for profit, to gain volume is not a satisfactory dealer," said Mr. Alfred.

COUNTY WINNERS BEST COLLECTION OF WILD FLOWERS

For the past seven weeks the rural school children of this county have been making a study of Oregon wild flowers and mounting specimens for the contest which is being conducted by the juvenile department of the Jackson county library. With the aid of flower guides, sent out from the central library, the children have made and classified some interesting and attractive collections, representing the flowers in every section of the county. The library offered a book on nature study as a prize to the school which sent in the largest and most beautifully made collection, but the work done by the children is so excellent that three additional prizes will be awarded.

The following schools are the prize winners:

Evans Valley, District 62.
Meadows, District 36.
Little Applegate, District 67.
Green Springs, District 40.

The collection from Evans Valley includes 94 specimens, accurately classified and beautifully pressed and mounted. The work done by these elementary school children would be a credit to high school or college students. The ten pupils from the Meadows school found a variety of 76 flowers for their booklet. Little Applegate school has 12 pupils, and their collection contains 57 unusually fine, large specimens. Green Springs school collected 43 varieties of flowers and the workmanship in mounting these is so excellent that this collection is among the prize winners, though it is a little smaller than some of the others submitted.

TICKETS GO FAST C. OF C. BANQUET
