SANDINO RAIDERS PLAN ATTACK ON AMERICAN COLONY

PUERTO CABEZAS, Nicaragua, Apr. 26.—(AP)—General Sandino's rebel forces have been planning an attack on Puerto Cabezas, where there are several hundred American residents. The raiders, who on April 12, under General Giron, attacked La Luz y Low Angeles mines, are reported to have intended to join forces with others for an advance against this town. Sandino himself was not with the raiders but they were under his orders. American marines commanded by Major Grey are on guard at Puerto Cabezas and the situation is well in hand. The United States light cruiser Denver is here. The attack against La Luz mine was carried out by 150 men armed with rifles and two machine guns. The mine is situated about 90 miles from Puerto Cabezas and was looted, the raiders taking gold and supplies valued at \$10,000. The raiders declared their orders were to take the head of Harry P. Amphlett, manager of the mine. Amphlett, fortunately, was absent. George H. Marshall, the American assistant manager of the mine, was taken prisoner. His fate is unknown.

MELLON APPROVES COMMITTEE TAX REDUCTION PLANS

WASHINGTON, April 26.—(AP)—Secretary Mellon said today that adoption by congress of the new republican tax plan calling for a \$210,000,000 reduction would be satisfactory to the treasury. The republican majority on the committee wrote into the bill the new rate schedules over the program of the democrats for a \$325,000,000 reduction. The formal report of the bill to the senate was held up until tomorrow when some administrative provisions will be settled. This proposal, if given final congressional approval, would be acceptable to the treasury, since Secretary Mellon announced today that a tax reduction of as high as \$210,000,000 would receive his sanction. The \$210,000,000 reduction program includes: Reduction of the corporation tax from 13 1/2 to 12 1/2 per cent. Repeal of the 3 per cent automobile tax. An increase in exemptions allowed corporations from \$2000 to \$5000. Downward revision of the rates applying on the intermediate surtax brackets. Increase in exemptions on the admissions tax from 75 cents to \$3.

LAKE SHIPS FREE FROM ICE PACKS

SALTL STE MARIE, Mich., April 26.—The ice chains which have bound 22 grain-laden steamers to the St. Mary's river through the winter have been partially broken. The tug Favorite late yesterday reached the steamer Eads, 12 miles below the Salt and towed it through the ice to put her to the southernmost point of the narrow band of water connecting Lakes Huron and Superior. The Favorite approached the steamer from the south. Before other vessels may be moved down the river, however, tugs must open a way through the ice to the point where the Eads was wintered. Warm weather may open the way before the end of the week.
