RARE NEW STONES ON DISPLAY HERE

A display of zircons, the rare new stone imported from Siam, estimated at \$5000 value, has attracted considerable admiration and comment on the part of Medford residents who have viewed it in Orphus's window during yesterday and today. This array of brilliant gems was brought to Medford direct from Los Angeles by Irving Orck, a well known authority on precious stones. The display, which shows the beautiful blue zircon, will be removed from Orphus's window at 6 o'clock this evening, but the local jeweler will lay in a stock of the gems within the near future. The zircon is said to be surpassed in brilliancy only by the diamond, to which it is nearest in refractive power. It is seven and one-half in hardness. It is found in white, blue and golden and is 40 per cent heavier than the diamond.

SPANISH WAR VETS OF VALLEY HOLD ANNUAL PICNIC

A noteworthy and very enjoyable event was the picnic of Spanish War Veterans and their families, held at Lathia park, Ashland, April 22, in observance of the thirtieth anniversary of the declaration of war against Spain. A social reunion was followed by an attack on the rations when "mess call" was blown by Boy Scout Ronald Krings of Medford; the number of tables being estimated at 100. Next came a fine musical entertainment by the Rogue River Valley Academy orchestra, including some appropriate patriotic and familiar selections which were deeply appreciated by the audience. Reverence was not overlooked and an invocation was delivered by State Chaplain T. L. Theumbler, United Spanish war veteran, of Medford. Addresses were given by State Commander Lee Hurst of Albany, State Inspector L. D. Mahone of Portland, Comrade M. L. Opliycke of Rogue River camp of Grants Pass, Comrade V. A. Davis of Scout Young camp but who is now of Jackson county, and by Comrades G. J. Newham, John J. Buchter and George B. Alden of Colonel Sargent camp, Spanish War Veterans. Especially deserving mention was an impressive address by a Civil war veteran guest, L. R. Grigsby of Tacoma, Wash., who is visiting Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Newland in Medford. The arrangements for the gathering were planned and managed, and the program was conducted, by Commander J. A. Hemstreet of Colonel Sargent camp. Four Civil war veterans were present as guests. Several Spanish war veterans and members of families attended from Grants Pass. Home folks represented various parts of Jackson county. TIME DRAWS NEAR TO APPLY SPRAY FOR CODLING MOTH

The calyx spray for the control of the codling moth on apples should be applied when 90 to 95 per cent of the petals have fallen. The purpose of this spray is to fill the calyx cups with poison at a time when they are open. The calyx cup of the apple will close within a week's time after the petals fall, and if protection from worms is to be obtained at this point, spraying should be done before the cups are closed.

In pear orchards where leaf and fruit worm, canker worm, etc., are present, it is advisable to apply this spray.

Materials to use: Powdered arsenate of lead, three or four pounds to the hundred gallons of water, or paste arsenate of lead, six or eight pounds to the hundred gallons of water.

Apply thoroughly, covering all leaves and young fruit as well as filling all calyx cups.
