

AUTOISTS URGED TO AID WELCOME TO COAST JUNKET

Every car owner in Medford is invited to turn out Friday at 1:30 and form a welcoming party to meet the All-Pacific Coast caravan, which started from San Francisco today and is making a tour of the coast, as far as Vancouver, for the purpose of visiting and cataloguing the combined scenic wonders of this section of the country.

More than 40 cars began the trip from San Francisco, and according to reports of the trip received from M. R. Clemenson, manager of the Jackson hotel, and committee chairman of local arrangements, the number will swell considerably as the caravan moves on through northern California.

Local residents and car owners are urged to make the trip to the Oregon border in as large a body as possible, in order to impress the visitors not only with the hospitality of Medford citizens, but to assist in pointing out attractions of the community. The Californians are scheduled to reach the Oregon border at three o'clock, arriving in Medford at 4:50.

Some of those who cannot make the trip to the border are making arrangements to go as far as Ashland. All who cannot meet the caravan at all by car are urged by the chamber of commerce and service club heads to gather in front of the chamber of commerce to welcome the visitors as they arrive. They can remain in Medford only 10 minutes, as they will attend the formal opening of Hotel Del Rogue at Grants Pass and eat dinner there tomorrow night.

The local high school band will play in front of the chamber of commerce, upon the arrival of the caravan in Medford. M. R. Clemenson will represent the Kiwanis club at the border, Horace Bromley will represent the Rotary club and Wally Drew, the Lions' club.

Wall Street Report NEW YORK, April 26.—(AP)—Persistent belief that a settlement had been reached in the eastern power situation, and that official announcement would soon be forthcoming, authorized another rapid rise in railroad shares or the stock exchange today. Simultaneously there was much activity among the high priced industrials, carrying some of them to new high levels for the year, or longer.

In the railroad group, shares involved in merger projects were the most in demand. Lehigh Valley rose \$8 a share to 116 and Wabash, after a moment of hesitancy, advanced nearly five dollars to 92 1/2. Delaware and Hudson, after dipping at the outset, rebounded to a new high level for the year.

The closing was strong. Vigorous constructive work in 11 a. m. broke out in copper, oil and local gas shares, along with a number of other stocks in which investors are interested. Individual blocks ranging from 11,000 to 30,000 shares changed hands in the oil group, elevating a number to new highs for the year. Consolidated Gas rose 6 1/2; American Express 2 1/2 and International Nickel and Greene Cananea Copper 4.

Profit taking reduced extreme advances in some of the rails. Lehigh Valley settling back to 111. Total sales approximated 4,000,000 shares.
