

# Oregon Pimento Rolls

[A Portland prize recipe]

2 cups bread flour 1/2 teaspoon salt  
4 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 cup milk or water  
pimento cheese

Sift dry ingredients together 3 times. Work in Crisco with fork. Add liquid gradually. Roll dough 1/4 in. thick. Spread with pimento cheese; roll as you would a jelly-roll. Cut slices 1/2 in. thick. Lay in Criscoed pan, cut side down, and bake in hot oven (410° F.) 15 to 20 minutes.
