## NOTED PHYSICIANS OF STATE WILL BE IN CITY, MAY 4TH

May 2 is a red letter day for Medford and Jackson county physicians, inasmuch that four state wide known specialists will be in the city for a conference with the members of the local medical profession. A banquet is to be held in the evening at the Hotel Medford, where Dr. Guy Strohn and Dr. C. J. McCusker of Portland will be the main speakers of the evening.

On the afternoon of that day, Dr. L. Howard Smith, well known Portland baby specialist, will be in charge of the regular monthly baby clinic to be held at the Y. W. C. A. Dr. Smith is regarded as being one of the most well versed specialists on the coast and Medford mothers are advised to make early appointments, as only the first 20 appointments will be accepted. The appointments may be made by telephoning the county health unit at 1557.

Dr. F. D. Stricker, secretary of the state board of health, will accompany the party to Medford and will probably also speak at the banquet to be held by the Jackson County Medical society, before which Dr. McCusker, an obstetrician, will speak on pre-natal care, while Dr. Strohn will speak on the treatment of constitutional diseases during pregnancy.

## GOVERNOR GREETSS CALIFORNIA AUTO CARAVAN AT PASS

SALEM, Ore., April 27.—Gov. Governor Patterson will leave today for Grants Pass, where he will meet the California motor caravan representing the Redwood Empire association. The governor will accompany the caravan to Salem, where a reception is to be given the Californians Monday.

The caravan was scheduled to arrive in Medford at 4:30 this afternoon and spend ten minutes here while en route to Grants Pass, where an elaborate program was prepared for them tonight. A delegation of local motorists was planned to meet the visitors at the state line at 3 o'clock this afternoon and escort the caravan to this city. The caravan is composed of 40 cars and 200 people, who were to be entertained with a concert by the state championship Medford high school band.

## LAWRENCE BACK FROM CALIFORNIA

Rev. E. P. Lawrence, who returned this morning from a brief visit to the San Anselmo Theological seminary in California, where he attended the graduation exercises held there yesterday, reports a large gathering of relatives and friends at the commencement, in which 13 graduates took part.

Leonard Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Frazier Brown of Medford was one of the graduates, and has accepted the post as pastor of the First Presbyterian church at Santa Clara, Calif. Following the graduation exercises, he was accompanied to his new station by his parents, who will visit with him there until the first of the week.

Rev. John W. Hoyt, Jr., was another graduate who formerly lived in Jackson county, and has accepted the position of assistant pastor of the Union church at Placerville, Calif.

## SHERIFF DESTROYS SEIZED LIQUOR

Having been found no longer necessary for evidence, a large quantity of confiscated intoxicating liquor was destroyed at the old county jail at Jacksonville last Tuesday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Paul Jennings, in the presence of H. C. Lyle, C. E. Wallace, Fred Combest and J. A. Norris. The destroyed liquor included eight 5-gallon kegs of moonshine, 30 pints of moonshine, 14 one-gallon jugs of moonshine, 223 pint bottles of beer, 26 cases of bottled whiskey, one five-gallon keg of wine, 84 gallons of alcohol and 84 pints of moonshine. The contraband had been seized during the past several months from rum runners and through county raids and was the main bulk of liquor held by the county authorities for evidence.

Larry Schade presided as substitute judge with Ronald Kring as sergeant at arms and Bernal Henry as court officer to assist Scout Executive Belcher.
