CLUB WOMEN OF VALLEY CONVENING THIS AFTERNOON

The district convention of Southern Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs convened at 2:30 this afternoon with representatives of women's clubs from every city in southern Oregon gathered in the Medford Presbyterian church for the introductory program. Miss Grace Chamberland of Ashland, president of the federation for this district, presided and gave an opening speech of welcome to the large aggregation of delegates. Her address was supplemented by brief talks given by Mrs. E. E. Clements, vice-president, of Talent, and Second Vice-President Mrs. L. Humphries of Central Point. The inspiring invocation written by James Thompson, 1726, was given in unison after which the audience sang "Oregon, My Oregon," accompanied on the piano by Jeannette Butler and led by Mrs. C. Mulholland. Mrs. N. C. Chasney led the salute to the flag. Mrs. R. C. Mulholland, president of the Greater Medford club, which is the hostess club of the convention, then extended greetings to the delegates and a response song was sung by the gathering of members. "Oregon Artists and Their Pictures" was an interesting topic covered by Mrs. Bethany of Klamath Falls, and "Parliamentary Painters" were given by Mrs. J. A. Gammill of Coleman Creek. Miss Fay Woolsey, Medford librarian, gave a talk on "The Public Library and the Club Woman." Mrs. Alice Ames Winter, president of the G. F. W. C., 1920-1924, outlined the first duty of a convention as being to provide for the delegates a program that will give them (1) ideas in club work and (2) the inspiration to put those ideas to work in their own communities. The convention will reopen tomorrow morning at 9:30 in the Presbyterian church.

D. A. R. BLACKLIST BRINGS PROTEST EUGENE CHAPTER

EUGENE, Ore., April 27.—(AP)—A vote of protest recently voiced by the Oregon Lewis and Clark chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, of Eugene, against action of the national defense committee in publishing the so-called "black lists" of prominent citizens and organizations throughout the country, has resulted in a letter sent to the national headquarters at Washington, D. C. The letter follows a reprint received by the Eugene group for "allowing" Kirby Page and Ben B. Lindsay to speak in Eugene. Action of the local group is being given wide publicity among the chapters on the western coast, and is as follows: "Mrs. Alfred J. Brosseau, President General N. S. D. A. R., Washington, D. C. "Dear Madam: The Oregon Lewis and Clark chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution of Eugene, Oregon, wish to protest against the attempts of the national chairman of the national defense committee of the D. A. R. in making to classify certain persons prominent in political and social service work and organizations, including the American Association of University Women, the National Educational Association, National Board of Y. W. C. A. and others, as unpatriotic, radical, and dangerous. When we are informed by our state chairman of national defense that we are untrue to our duties as citizens and members of the D. A. R. when we allowed Kirby Page and Judge Lindsay to speak in Eugene, we resent the implication, for we believe in the free and open discussion of all social and political issues and are opposed to this type of censorship. "As descendants of the founders of the republic, we feel that we should hold a higher vision of tolerance toward the opinions of sincere persons and should cultivate a more intelligent patriotism than is implied by such pamphlets as 'Pacifism Kept Alive by Fifty Organizations,' a pamphlet being circulated by the defense committee. We believe it to be the highest patriotic duty of every citizen to work for world peace and the eventual abolition of war, and therefore, are not committed without reservation to the national defense act, as opposed to so-called pacifism. "In closing we wish to state that this is not the opinion of a small group within our chapter, but is the unanimous expression of the members at our last meeting when a large attendance was present. "Respectfully, "Oregon Lewis and Clark Chapter, D. A. R., Eugene Ore." Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, April 27.—(AP)—Gigantic speculation for the advance on the New York stock exchange today sent prices of active issues rising 2 1/2 to nearly 4 1/2 a share, and completely swamped the machinery of the exchange. Orders piled onto the floor from all sections of the country in such tremendous volume that the ticket fell 40 minutes behind the market by early afternoon when the closing changing hands in blocks of 5000 to 12,000 shares, assumed the leadership of the advance. Consolidated Gas extended its early gain to nearly 10 points by touching a new high record at 157 1/2. His Chalmers advanced more than 7 points to a new top at 129 1/2. The closing was strong. Recognized leaders, such as Radio and General Motors and several other high priced stocks began to compete with the oil for popularity in the late afternoon when changing sentiment regarding international and business conditions stimulated buying. Radio, General Motors, American Express and DuPont gained four points or so and Case Threshing Machine advanced exceeded 10 points. Total sales approximated 4,300,000 shares.
