

ATHLETICS CLIMB IN PENNANT RACE, CLEVELAND WINS

The Philadelphia Athletics ran rough shod over Washington yesterday, carving out a 10 to 0 decision to place them right behind the New York Yankees and Cleveland Indians.
A six-run rally in the eighth enabled the Yankees to whip the Boston Red Sox at New York, 9 to 4.
The Indians kept pace by beating the Detroit Tigers at Cleveland, 6 to 1.
Home-runs by Blue and Schulte, each with a man on base, aided the Browns to register a 5 to 5 triumph over the Chicago White Sox at St. Louis.
Idle for days because of inclement weather, the New York Giants, leading the National league parade, opened a series with Philadelphia by dropping a 5 to 4 verdict to the Quakers.
Ed Brandt, Seattle rookie, pitched the weakened Boston Braves to a 4 to 0 victory over Dazzy Vance and the Brooklyn Dodgers.
Carmen Hill won his first victory of the year when the Pittsburgh Pirates beat Cincinnati at Forbes field, 7 to 2. The cold weather forced postponement of an encounter at Chicago between the Cubs and the St. Louis Cardinals.
