

ROSEBURG NAMED FOR NEXT DISTRICT PYTHIAN SESSION

The southern Oregon district convention of the Knights of Pythias was held in Medford yesterday with large delegations present from Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford, Ashland and Klamath Falls. This district is known as district No. 4 in the grand domain of Oregon.

The convention was called to order at 2:45 p. m. by District Deputy Grand Chancellor H. C. Trechler, after which Vice Grand Chancellor Stanton Rowell of Grants Pass was formally presented.

George Ware of Alpha No. 47 of Roseburg read a paper on "Ritualistic Work". M. C. Gaston of Thermopylae No. 59 of Grants Pass gave a talk on "What Benefit to the Knights of Pythias is the Pythian Sister Order?" L. A. Roberts of Ashland, No. 117 of Ashland, was next on "How to Attract New Members and Keep Them". Grand Vice Chancellor Rowell was then called upon and spoke on "The Importance of the Ritualistic Work." This was followed by a discussion on the different subjects.

At 6 o'clock the Pythian Sisters served one of their famous suppers.

The convention reconvened at 8:15 p. m. starting off with the election of officers. F. P. Robinson of Medford was elected treasurer and E. E. Wimberly of Roseburg, secretary. Roseburg was selected as the meeting place for the fall convention.

Chancellor Commander Clarence E. Jaqua of Talsman lodge then presented Medford's paper on "How to Increase Lodge Attendance." A delegation was present from Klamath Falls, but through some misunderstanding their paper was not presented.

The following were then elected to judge the ritualistic contest: Knights-Jaquette, Strong, Williams, Yannis, Pittenger, Gaylord, Rowell, Parker and Woods. Contestants in the page rank were: M. C. Gaston representing Grants Pass; S. R. Radke representing Klamath Falls; Wm. Bowden representing Roseburg; Pat Dunn representing Ashland; E. W. Jaqua representing Medford.

Two separate contests were conducted in two separate parts in the night contest. Contestants in the first contest: Jasper Bennett, Klamath Falls; H. E. Briggs, Ashland; James Stewart, Medford. In the second were J. C. Householder, Roseburg; E. E. Gore, Medford; S. R. Radke, Klamath Falls; A. T. Underwood, Grants Pass; J. B. Saunders, Ashland.

E. E. Wimberly, the new secretary, then took charge of his office and read a letter from Grand Keeper of Records and Seal Walter G. Gleason of Portland who was unable to be present.

The judges then returned and announced the following winners: Page rank, Wm. Bowden of Roseburg first; E. W. Jaqua of Medford second. First contest in knights rank, James Stewart of Medford first; Jasper Bennett of Klamath Falls second. Second contest in knight rank, E. E. Gore of Medford first; J. C. Householder of Roseburg second.

Grand Vice Chancellor Stanton Rowell then gave a very interesting talk as did L. C. Jaquette of

Hornbrook and others who were present from other jurisdictions. There were 24 past chancellors and one past grand chancellor present. Talkman lodge of Medford had the largest number present, while Alpha lodge of Roseburg was second.

Royal Vicer Carl Flehmer of the D. O. K. K. announced the next monthly business meeting will be held in Medford Saturday, May 5 and that many new things are promised that will be of special interest to all Dokes.

All present then retired to the banquet room where the Pythian Sisters again had a feed ready.
