Health Honor Parade Important School Event
(By Miss Josephine Jones)
Final plans for the health honor roll parade were made at a meeting held Tuesday, April 24, at the office of the city school superintendent.

This parade being held in Medford Friday, May 4, is for all children in the county who have earned a place on the health honor roll.

It has been necessary for many of these children to get corrections of physical defects done in order to be eligible. Those having dental defects have visited the dentist and brought a statement from him that necessary dental work is done. Undereights and overweights, when necessary, have been under the care of their family doctor to gain or lose. Enlarged thyroids (goiter) are taking iodine or using iodized salt. Diseased tonsils have been removed or under the care of the doctor. Those with flat feet are taking exercises to strengthen the muscles of the arches of the feet.

Those having defects of heart, lungs, or other defects are under the care of their family physician. The parents have shown their interest and enthusiasm by getting these things attended to.

The parade will form in front of the junior high school at 1 p. m. The school will line up as follows: Central Point leading, then Eagle Point, Gold Hill, Jacksonville, Phoenix, followed by the Medford schools in the following order: Junior high, Jackson, Lincoln, Roosevelt and Washington.

The Medford high school band will lead the Medford units marching just behind the units from the county schools.

Pupils too small to march will be carried in cars donated for the occasion.

Following the parade suitable exercises will be held at the high school, where the award of badges will be made by the county school superintendent.

The Medford health honor cup will be awarded by Mrs. Josephine Jones of the city winning it.

At the close of the exercises in the building the department of physical education under Miss Maude Barriger will present a May festival on the high school lawn. The program will consist of folk dances in costume, representing different nations, tumbling and pyramid building, solo dances, wind and athletic drills, a flag drill and marching tactics, and Maypole dances by all the grade schools.

At the end of the program and the completion of the pageant, a national shield has been formed in colors the Maypole dancers making the stars, the wand drill, the blue and white stripes, the ribbon dancers the red stripes, the complete shield enclosed by the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts in khaki uniforms.

Moving pictures will probably be taken of the parade and May festival exercises.
