The Lincoln school won the inter-grade school meet, while the senior class won the high school inter-class meet.

The seventh and eighth grades of the Junior high tied with 29 points each, the two grades competing only among themselves.

The outstanding entrant of the day's meet was Dea Higdon of the Junior high, who in a high jump nearly equalled the world's record for high jumps by girls in her class by clearing the stick at four feet and three inches. This mark surpassed the high jump record made by the senior class girls, the outstanding entrants of which included Vivian Coss, Althea Higdon, Marjorie Lindley and Dorothy Randall in jumping and in distance throw of baseballs and basketballs.

The high school boys did not take part in the meet, which was well attended by spectators throughout the day, especially in the forenoon when the grade school meet was in full swing.
