VALLEY HIGHS TO HOLD TRACK MEET

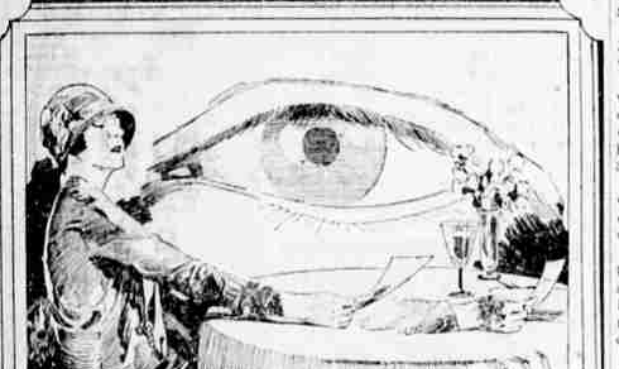
