WEEK TO INCREASE EATING OF EGGS BEGINS TOMORROW

PORTLAND, Ore., April 29.—(AP)—The week commencing tomorrow and lasting through May 7 has been designated by the bureau of agricultural economics as "National Egg week." The purpose of the campaign is to increase the per capita consumption of eggs. "Eggs for Vitamins," "Take Your Iron in Eggs," "Eat Eggs Every Day," were a few of the slogans prepared by the National Poultry Council. Prices of eggs and butter were unchanged on local wholesale markets today, with a firm market noticeable on all grades. Saturday's receipts were: Butter 29,754 pounds; eggs, 1469 cases. Storage holdings were reported at 25,132 pounds of butter and 57,792 cases of eggs. Park prices were slightly higher at the opening today on country dressed meat markets, with best light hogs bringing 15 cents top. Indications are that the pork prices will continue to advance slightly.

Vent continued drab with receipts heavy and considerable holdover supply on hand. Poultry markets were quiet this morning with quotations about on a level with Saturday's close. Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, April 29.—(AP)—Marking up of the call money rate from five to six per cent checked a sharp upswing in prices in today's stock market. Oil, was again in the vanguard of the advance, climbing one to ten points with about a score of issues touching new peak prices. Rails were inclined to heaviness, although Delaware and Hudson ran up five points in the early trading. The closing was heavy. A number of representative issues, including Radio, Sears, Roebuck, A. T. & T., Chemical, Case Threshing Machine and General Railway Signal were down 3 to 5 points and Delaware and Hudson lost all its gain before the market began to show the effect of some supporting orders in the last hour. Radio rallied from 17 1/2 to 18 1/2 and Pullman, Leona and Consolidated Gas also manifested strength but the general movement was sluggish. Adams express after advancing five points to 27 1/2 collapsed to 26 1/2. Total sales approximated 4,190,000 shares.
