MAY DAY IS QUIET; ALL IS WELL AT NEW YORK POLICE RESERVES ON DUTY

NEW YORK, May 1.—(AP)—The entire New York police force, some 21,000 uniformed men and several hundred detectives, were on active and reserve duty today to guard against possible May day disorders. Police headquarters said no disorders were expected, but that inspections of the meeting places of radical and communist printing plants indicated an unusual amount of revolutionary literature recently had been circulated.

The socialist action committee in a letter to Police Commissioner Warren demanded he rescind orders instructing the police to arrest all persons responsible for distribution of illegal literature. The letter called the order an "invitation to disorder."

BRATISLAVA, Czechoslovakia, May 1.—(AP)—The newspaper Slovensky Denik said a dining club had been set up by a group of Maygars to send agents to Vienna to seize Bela Kun, Hungarian communist now imprisoned there. He would be taken to Budapest to expiate his crime during the bolshevik dictatorship in Hungary.

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, May 1.—(AP)—The three socialist parties celebrated May day with parades and mass meetings in which over 100,000 persons participated. The parades carried banners denouncing capitalism and demanding division of the church from state and school, while the communists demanded the immediate release of Bela Kun, the Hungarian communist, from jail in Vienna.

JEW ADVENTURER HANDY WITH GUNS, HIES FROM CHINA

CANTON, May 1.—(AP)—Morris Cohen, two-gun-man from Canada, who served the late Dr. Sun Yat-Sen as body guard, for the last three years of the revolutionary leader's life, has left Canton for an unnamed destination. Of the polyglot coterie of foreigners who assembled about Dr. Sun's person in Canton, red Russians, Americans, Germans—this burly, free-handed Jewish adventurer is believed to have been the last of any prominence remaining in China. He turned up here six years ago with a letter of recommendation from revolutionary Chinese in Edmonton, Canada, whence he hailed. After he had given one display of his prize feat of marksmanship—throwing two coins in the air simultaneously, drawing two pistols and hitting both coins in mid-air—the job of bodyguard and chauffeur to Dr. Sun was his.

When the Kuomintang leader died in 1925 his will stipulated that Cohen should have a life job in the Canton government's central bank. This he held, acting also as messenger and purchasing agent for Canton officials, until he became involved in the red uprising of last December. The result was his purchase of a one-way ticket from the scene of this six-year phase of his career.

DEMOCRATS HOLD ONLY INTEREST IN CALIFORNIA VOTE

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—(AP)—With the outcome of nation-wide scope and a spirited campaign and in view of promising a heavy vote, California voters today cast their ballots in the presidential primary for three democratic candidates, a republican and a prohibitionist.

The three-sided democratic contest was between Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York; Senator James A. Reed of Missouri; and Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana.

GIRL TRIBUNAL OF CHINA REDS PAYS FOR HER CRUELTY

SHANGHAI, May 1.—(AP)—Refugees from northern and western Hupeh today brought stories of red terrorism in the districts from which they fled. They confirmed earlier reports of the sack of Kingmen and the slaying of 5000 inhabitants by bandits.

Messages from Hankow said executions of communists were occurring there daily. A girl of 17, who acted as a member of the red tribunal, which is held responsible for the many sentences of torture and death, was one of the victims.

NEW YORK, May 1.—(AP)—A "blacklist party," to be attended only by those whose names have been blacklisted as speakers by the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Key Men of America will be held here on May 9.

UNIONTOWN, Pa., May 1.—(AP)—Nine persons were drowned today when a small boat sank in the Monongahela river between Mason-town and Greensboro. A floating log crashed into the boat and capsized it.

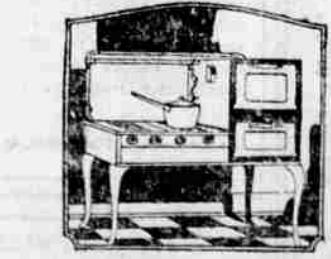
