SALEM, Ore., May 1.—(AP)—California who are touring the coast with the Redwood Empire caravan heard of the resources and natural advantages of the Willamette valley when they banqueted here last night with leading citizens of Salem and the state of Oregon.

Notwithstanding the rain that greeted the visitors, Governor Patterson enlarged upon the incomparable climate of the valley and summarized the industries of Polk and Marion counties, emphasizing the numerous world records made by dairy cattle of the district.

Herb Wiedoeft Explains Making Phonograph Records

The making of phonograph records is one of the most interesting and difficult tasks which falls to the lot of modern jazz musicians, says Herb Wiedoeft, whose recording orchestra is to provide the thrills for Medford music lovers Monday and Tuesday, May 7 and 8, at Hunt's Craterian theatre. "It takes long experience and endless calculation to learn how to gauge the positions of different instruments. You must learn by experiments just which ones must be closer to the receiving horn than others; which ones have a tone that cuts through the others, and which have to be coaxed forward. You can't always stay in one place through a whole number, either. As the melody is passed from one instrument to another, you have to move them to keep it always in evidence. Of course, with the modern improvements the task is simplified somewhat but even then it is difficult and requires considerable study.
