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AUTHOR WHO CAST QUIPS AT CUPID STEPS TO ALTAR

CANNES, France, May 1.—(AP)—Michael Arlen, the novelist, and Countess Atlanta Mercate were married in a five-minute civil ceremony today at the British consulate. The ceremony took place at 11:45 a. m. and was to be followed with a religious ceremony at the Greek orthodox church of Cannes. The witnesses were Princess Karageorgievitch, formerly Mrs. H. Pratt of New York; the bride's grandmother, Mrs. Henriette Von Plügel; her mother, Edward Montgomerie and Leonard Mercate. The groom, who is of American origin, registered his father's name as Sarkis Koujournidjion, occupation "shipper." The wedding of the brilliant author of the "Green Hat" and other books, whose quip at modern love and marriage have echoed around the world to the beautiful young woman who is a descendant of Serbian royalty, was one of the final events of the season for international society on the Riviera. Scores of people remained for weeks in order to be present. After their honeymoon the Arlens expect to stay for a while at the Villa Fiorantina, one of the most beautiful estates on the Riviera.

FIRST AID GIVEN BY AMERICA IN CORINTH QUAKE

CORINTH, Greece, May 1.—(AP) The Stars and Stripes flying above devastated and destitute Corinth today brought relief to a people stricken by a series of earthquakes and brought expressions of gratitude from the whole of Greece. Admiral Paul Koundouriotis, president of Greece, went as he watched the flag flying above the American army tent of Mrs. Emma Cushman of Boston, who is in charge of the first aid station. He said: "That is a real symbol of sympathy, generosity and love which has touched our hearts and kindled our souls." Fourteen babies which were brought into a shaking world which destroyed the homes of their parents were being cared for in the tents by Near East relief nurses. They were rocked in cradles built from barrel staves and fed from tin cans which once contained American condensed milk.

Proposed Change of Zone Ordinance. The City Planning Commission proposes a revision of the present zoning ordinance in which the present Zone IV (Semi-public) would be combined with the present Zone II, and parks would be included in Zone I. The Use Districts would then be as follows: Class I Residence—Single family dwellings, parks and playgrounds. Class II Residence—(Including D) Apartments of all classes except as restricted by the building ordinance, public and semi-public buildings, churches, schools, hospitals, mortuaries, etc. Class III Retail business (Including I and II). Class IV Present Zone V: Warehouse. Class V Present Zone VI: Industrial. It is proposed to extend the limits of Use Districts II, III, IV and V, subject to the approval of the property holders in the districts affected. Class I—All of Humphrey-Andrews Addition and Humphrey-Knight Addition, that part of Sunrise Home Park and Laurelhurst adjoining Crater Lake Avenue, West Main Street, all property adjoining Block 8; all property adjoining East Main Street from Cottage Street East; all property adjoining Myrtle Street; Blocks 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57, 58, 59, 60, 61, 62, 63, 64, 65, 66; also all territory adjoining Riverside Avenue from the North City Limits to Boyd Street; also the territory at the intersection of Stewart Avenue and South Riverside Avenue; property near the intersection of McAndrews Road and North Central Avenue; property adjoining East Jackson Street from Genesee Street west to P. & E. right of way; property on the south side of East Main Street from Almond Street to Genesee Street.
