

# SENATORS BEATEN FARRELL, FAMED 8 IN ROW; MACKS FOR PUTTS, HOPES FOR BIGGER TITLE KEEP ON WINNING

The American league race, so far as it concerns the New York Yankees and Washington Senators, seems to have resolved itself into a personal duel between Babe Ruth and Bucky Harris' crew of pitchers.

Ruth cracked out homer No. 5, a triple and two singles off Marberry and Van Alstyne at the capital yesterday and the Senators took their eighth consecutive beating, 5 to 2. It was the Yankees' sixth straight win.

Four of Ruth's five homers have been achieved at the expense of Washington pitching.

Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics kept pace with the title-holders by beating the Red Sox, 5 to 3, stretching their winning streak to seven in a row. Cobb's single in the eighth drove in the tying and winning runs.

Cleveland retained second place, a step ahead of the Mackmen, by taking a 4 to 3 battle with the St. Louis Browns. Sixteen hits, seven of them doubles, allowed the Detroit Tigers to bury the Chicago White Sox under a 10 to 5 score.

By scoring their second straight win over Brooklyn, 4 to 2, the New York Giants moved into first place in the National league race, a half game ahead of the Dodgers.

Old Grover Alexander was subjected to a terrific barrage as the Cincinnati Reds beat the Cardinals at St. Louis, 6 to 3.

Carmen Hill turned in another fine performance at Pittsburgh, as the Pirates beat the Cubs again, 4 to 1.

Bunched hits off Walsh and Miller gave the Boston Braves their second straight win over the Phils, 5 to 3.

## LEWIS TO MEET LUTZE TONIGHT

LOS ANGELES, May 2.—(AP)—Nick Lutze, popular young Chicago mat star, tonight will make a bid for the world's heavyweight wrestling championship, meeting the famous headlock hold of the titleholder, Ed (Strangler) Lewis, with his blemishing packknife scissors and the champion's greater weight and experience with speed and the strength of youth.

But Lewis, at 37½ with 16 years of grappling experience behind him, was favored over Lutze of whose 25 years, six have been devoted to wrestling.

When Lewis crawls into the ring tonight he will weigh 225 pounds, about 20 more than Lutze.

The match is two out of three falls to a finish.

# MAD BULL TRAINS FOR MARATHON ON REDWOOD HIGHWAY

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2.—(AP)—At least a dozen runners are training for the Redwood highway Indian marathon from San Francisco to Grants Pass, Ore. It starts June 14.

Mad Bull, last year's winner, and his running mate, Flying Cloud, who came in second, are resting off a few miles daily at Eugene, Ore., under William "Bill" Hayward, track coach at the University of Oregon.

Five fleet-footed members of the Zuni tribe in Arizona will make a bid for some part of the \$10,000 in prizes. Those in charge received this word from Mike Kirk, noted trainer of Indian runners.

Colors of Headstart, Calif., will be carried by Hummingbird, whose backers claim he is one of the fastest runners on the coast. Joe LaFontaine, unable to compete last year because of a fractured ankle, will represent Crescent City.

Every runner in the 182½ mile trek must complete the 489-miles in 10 days.

**Proposed Change of Zone Ordinance.**

The City Planning Commission proposes a revision of the present zoning ordinance in which the present Use Zone IV (Semi-public) would be combined with the present Zone II, and parks would be included in Zone I.

The Use Districts would then be as follows:

Class I Residence—Single family dwellings, parks and playgrounds.

Class II Residence—(Including 1) Apartments of all classes except as restricted by the building ordinance, public and semi-public buildings, churches, schools, hospitals, mortuaries, etc.

Class III Retail business (including I and II).

Class IV Present Zone V: Warehouse.

Class V Present Zone VI: Industrial.

It is proposed to extend the limits of Use Districts II, III, IV and V, subject to the approval of the property holders in the districts affected.

Class I—All of Humphreys-Andrews Addition and Humphreys-Knight Addition, that part of Sunrise Home Park and Laurelhurst adjoining Crater Lake Avenue; all of Queen Anne Addition (excluding Block 8); all property adjoining East Main Street from Cottage Street East; all property adjoining Myrtle Street; Blocks 1, 2, 3, 8, 12, 14, and part of Blocks 7 and 9 of Imperial Addition, and all property East and South thereof to the City Limits; all property included in the area bounded by the following streets and alleys: Columbus Avenue, the alley between Fourth and Second Streets, the alley between Morey's Addition and Bungalow Addition, West Main Street; all property adjoining South Oakdale Avenue, Park Street, Whitman Avenue, from Eleventh Street south, and K Street from alley in Block 2, Stewart town Addition south; also all property adjoining Stewart Avenue for approximately 300 feet north and south of same.

Class II—All property not included in Zones I, III, IV and V.

Class III—Approximately all of the original town except Blocks 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 60, 61, 62, 68, 70, 71, 72, 73, 74, 75, 77, 80, 81, 82, and part of Blocks 63, 64, 65 and 66; also all territory adjoining Riverside Avenue from the North City Limits to Boyd Street; also the property at the intersection of Stewart Avenue and South Riverside Avenue; property near the intersection of McAndrews Road and North Central Avenue; property adjoining East Jackson Street from Genesee Street west to P. & E. right of way; property on the south side of East Main Street from Almond Street to Genesee Street.

Class IV—Property adjoining the S. P. tracks from north of Jackson Street to a point near McAndrews Road, and from North Street South to a point near Stewart Avenue.

Class V—The present mill district in the north end of the city, and the tract lying east of the Middle Road.

Maps showing the exact extent of the proposed Use Zones may be seen at the Chamber of Commerce and the City Hall. Remonstrances against the proposed changes will be heard at the regular meeting of the City Planning Commission to be held at 8 p. m., Monday, May 14th, 1928.
