GOVERNOR NAMES BEATRICE WALTON AS PRIVATE SEC'Y

SALEM, Ore., May 3.—(AP)—Miss Beatrice Walton of Salem has been appointed by Governor Patterson as his private secretary. She succeeds Hal E. Hoss of Oregon City, who resigned March 1 to give his attention to his candidacy for the republican nomination for secretary of state.

Miss Walton has been connected with state offices for a number of years.

For several years she was with the state educational department. When Mr. Patterson became governor in January, 1927, he appointed her to the head clerical position in the executive office. Since the resignation of Hoss she has shouldered the duties of the secretary.

By virtue of her office Miss Walton becomes a member of the state parole board.

Miss Walton was educated in the public schools of Salem and in Mills College, California. After graduation from college she taught for two years at Astoria.

SINCLAIR DENIES STEWART KNEW OF SOURCE OF BONDS

WASHINGTON, May 3.—(AP)—Harry F. Sinclair told the senate Teapot Dome committee today that he and Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, frequently discussed the Continental Trading company oil deals but that neither disclosed to the other that he was getting bonds from the Continental or from H. M. Blackmer, who was described as the principal figure in the transaction.

Testimony before the committee has been that Stewart and Sinclair received more than three-quarters of a million each after the Continental had sold oil to their companies at a profit of 25 cents a barrel. This money, they have testified, has now been turned back to the Sinclair crude oil purchasing company, owned jointly by the Sinclair and Standard of Indiana interests.

Sinclair said today that his oil concerns and the Standard of Indiana entered into partnership for business reasons.

"It was advantageous to both," he declared, explaining that both companies and the Standard had large refineries in Chicago and Kansas City, and they went into the Sinclair Pipe Line company so as to get oil to those refineries.

MISSION WORKER SLAIN BY CHINESE

SHANGHAI, May 3.—(AP)—A message received today from a Presbyterian missionary in southern Shantung said that Dr. Walter P. Seymour, superintendent of the Presbyterian hospital at Tsingang, had been slain by soldiers of the nationalist general, Feng Yu-Hsiang, when he tried to prevent them from entering the girls' dormitory.

The message, which was dated April 25, said the soldiers surrounded the hospital on April 16. A group started to enter the dormitory of the mission and Dr. Seymour attempted to prevent them. The soldiers cut short the parley by killing him.

The missionary asked that his location and name be withheld, due to the "precarious situation" of all the missionaries in the area. He did not want to aggravate the soldiers by seeming to act as an informer.

SEA BASS SALE URGED, OPPOSED

MARSHFIELD, Ore., May 3.—(AP) The Marshfield chamber of commerce today launched a fight to allow striped sea bass taken by commercial fishermen in Coos bay to be disposed of for profit. An agreement entered into by commercial fishermen two years ago, sanctioned by the state game commission, allowed sea bass taken in shad fishing operations to be sold. This expires May 9. The fish commission will be asked to extend this agreement one year, in the meantime making an investigation.

Sportsmen on Coos bay asked the game commission to prohibit sale of sea bass caught in nets after May 9. It became known here. Commercial fishermen claim bass will increase rapidly despite legal netting. Two tons was estimated as this year's catch.

VIENNA ACTRESS PLANS OCEAN HOP

BERLIN, May 3.—(AP) The plans of Lilli Dillenz, the Viennese actress, and her pilot John Hietzer, for a flight across the Atlantic in the Junkers plane Europa advanced another step today with the departure for Baldonnel, Ireland, of the same engineer and mechanic who put the Bremen in shape for the successful adventure of Baron Von Huenefeld and his companions. An Ireland-bound ship also carries the necessary petrol and oil for the trip.

Asked whether she might not, at the last minute, fly the southern course, via the Azores, Miss Dillenz said:

"Not on your life. I don't ever want to see Horta again," referring to her unsuccessful adventure of last year when she was a passenger on the Junkers trans-Atlantic attempt which ended at Horta.

BLAST YANK MINE IN NICARAGUA

BLUEFIELDS, Nicaragua, May 3.—(AP)—The American-owned gold mines, La Luz and Bonanza, in northern Nicaragua, have been blown up and destroyed by raiders, according to reports received today.

Assistant Manager Johnson of the La Luz mines, authority for the news, reported that all of the dynamite at the mines was used to blow them up and to effect complete destruction. The region is deserted by the natives. The band responsible for the outrage moved off in an unknown direction.

The fate of George H. Marshall, assistant manager of the La Luz mine, reported to have been seized by the rebels who raided the mine on April 12, is still unknown.

UPSTATE PRUNES HURT BY RAINS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 3.—(AP) Damage to prunes by cold rains is becoming more apparent with a heavy drop reported from practically all districts, says the weather bureau's weekly Oregon crop report. Prunes and cherries were also injured to a lesser extent in the Willamette valley. Apples are now blooming under more favorable conditions.

Winter wheat showed some improvement, due to the increased amount of sunshine, mostly in eastern localities, but in the Willamette valley the soil is too cold and wet for best growth. Seeding of spring wheat, which has been retarded by rain is now progressing rapidly in the eastern part of the state.

CARAVAN WENDS INTO WASHINGTON

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 3.—(AP) The Redwood Empire caravan, enroute from California to Victoria, B. C., was formally welcomed to Washington today at the inter-state bridge, on arrival from Portland.

Governor Ronald Hartley and Mayor J. P. Kiggins, a committee of the chamber of commerce, and Vancouver high school band met the travelers at the bridge and Mayor Kiggins delivered a speech.

The caravan proceeded to Longview and thence to go to Puget Sound cities and British Columbia.

ORATOR NAMED AS ST. PAUL MAYOR

ST. PAUL, Minn., May 3.—(AP)—The magnetic personality of Lawrence C. "Larry Ho" Hodgson, orator and writer of verse, again has won him the approval of St. Paul citizens as mayor.

He was re-elected for the second successive term and fourth time since 1915 in yesterday's municipal election, obtaining the largest plurality ever given a St. Paul mayor candidate.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 3.—(AP)—H. J. Walker, proprietor of the Princess Pat apartments, died at a hospital today from burns received April 21, when an oil furnace back-fired while he was priming it. His bathrobe and pajamas caught fire and he rushed out of the building. His wife turned a hose on him but the fire had inflicted severe burns before it was extinguished.
