## LANDIS ASKS THAT SMALL BOYS GET PLACE FOR PLAY

Montreal, May 3.—(AP)—Lack of playground space in most large cities, which forces youngsters to play baseball on the streets, or else not play ball at all, is deplored by Kenesaw M. Landis of Chicago, commissioner of professional baseball.

He gave his views at a luncheon celebrating the entry of Montreal into the International league.

Noting that vacant lots where youngsters could get together had been disappearing in the buildings up of big cities, he said:

"We need communities which will do their duty to the 10-12-14 year old boy of this generation.

"I have a lot of friends among boys; have a great correspondence with them, and I am inclined to think, if called upon to choose the element whose friendship would retain, if I were privileged by some sort of decree to have the friendship of only one element, I would choose boys.

"And I do not want to feel that my generation is cheating them. Remember that the 10-12-14 year old boy is pretty cute. He knows whether or not he is being given a square deal.

"I do not ask you to tear down your downtown business blocks to take the property and make playgrounds, but I ask you to resolve that now, from this time on, we will have places around the town for this purpose. You can get today for dollars what in 10 years from now will cost you thousands. And if it isn't done today, you will have to face the problem 10 years from now. It has to be done."

## IMITATES TURKEY, KILLED FOR ONE

STONY POINT, La., May 3.—(AP)—The talent of W. W. Noble, farmer for gobbling like a wild turkey was responsible for his death here today. ## CLAIMS CHANGED M'NARY MEASURE WORSE THAN EVER

WASHINGTON, May 3.—(AP)—First hand information of the successful attack in the house yesterday on the equalization fee of the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill was carried to the White House today when President Coolidge was informed by Representative Fort of New Jersey that even complete elimination of the fee would render the bill only slightly less objectionable than before.

Fort, a republican member of the house agriculture committee and a strong opponent of the farm bill now before the house said he told Mr. Coolidge that another objectionable feature of the measure is that section which provides for marketing agreements by which the proposed federal farm board would have power to make contracts for the purchase and sale of foodstuffs.

An effort was made by Fort yesterday to have this provision stricken but his amendment to that effect, to alter the substitute farm bill of Representative Aswell democrat, Louisiana, who is seeking to have his measure replace the McNary-Haugen bill, failed 100 to 48.

This provision is regarded by Representative Fort as the fundamentally objectionable feature of the bill as he believes this would be the machinery whereby prices would be fixed. The equalization fee, in his opinion, is merely incidental to this provision and devised to provide funds to put the plan into execution.

Abolition of the equalization fee without the repeal of the section to which he objects, would make the bill even worse, the New Jersey congressman said because the expenses contingent to the execution of the McNary-Haugen principle would have to be directly financed by the federal treasury without any opportunity for at least partial returns from equalization fee collections.

## STEINER TO START QUIZ ON MONDAY

WASHINGTON, May 3.—(AP)—All presidential candidates are to be asked to appear before the special senate committee named to inquire into campaign expenditures.

The committee dispatched telegrams today to all of the candidates asking them to testify at their convenience and also to name their agents who could report on expenditures.

Chairman Steiner believes a start of the investigation ordered by the senate may be made by next Monday, in view of the fact that many of the candidates already are in Washington.

Quizzing of the candidates themselves is a new procedure in this kind of an investigation.

Fourteen men—six republicans and eight democrats—were asked by telegraph to please indicate the earliest convenient date for the taking of their testimony. They were:

Republicans—Frank O. Lowden, Herbert Hoover, and Senators Watson of Indiana, Curtis of Kansas, Norris of Nebraska, and Goff of West Virginia.

Democrats—Governor Smith of New York; Senators Reed of Missouri, Walsh of Montana and George of Georgia; Governor Ritchie of Maryland; Representative Cordell Hull of Tennessee; Gilbert Hitchcock of Nebraska and Atlee Pomerene of Ohio.

The American girl has impressed both women, while Mrs. Koehl said she also was impressed by the American man.

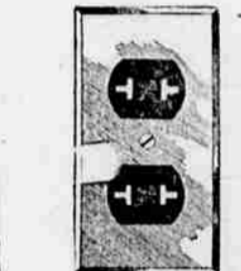

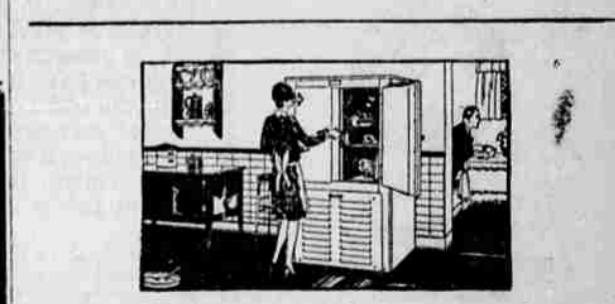

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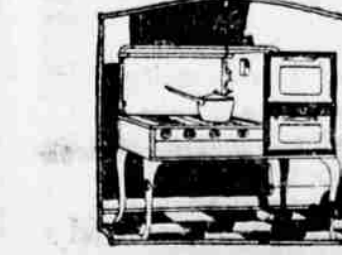
