NEW YORK, May 4.—(AP)—Jack Dempsey and his wife, Estelle Taylor, are to tread the boards of Broadway under the tutelage of David Belasco next fall.

The former heavyweight champion and his movie actress wife have signed on the dotted line with Sam H. Harris to appear in "The Big Fight," a Broadway theater. Mr. Belasco will direct the show in rehearsals starting some time in August. It is scheduled to open in September.

Mr. Harris said the contract called for the highest salaries ever paid in any theatrical production.

Practically every heavyweight champion has appeared on the legitimate stage, from the days of John L. Sullivan, but James J. Corbett is about the only one whose talent as an actor has received serious attention.

Twenty years ago Mr. Harris starred his first fighter when he produced "The Bowery After Dark," with the late Terry McGovern in the leading role.

KING GEORGE IS WINNER OF RACE FOR BIG PRIZE

NEWMARKET, England, May 4.—(AP)—Running under the colors of King George, Seattle led a field of 14 entries home to win the classic thousand guineas stake today.

Lord Dewar's Jurisdiction was second and Lord Derby's Toboggan third.

The winner is by Captain Cattle from Stained Glass. Captain Cattle won the derby in 1922.

The betting was 15 to 8 on Seattle, 100 to 8 on Jurisdiction and 11 to 2 on Toboggan.

Faces of the King and Prince of Wales were wreathed in smiles as the king's brown filly flashed past the winning post. It was the king's first classic victory of the season, and loud cheers sounded at the finish.

The cheering, however, was not all for the sovereign's victory. Seattle, after winning over nine furlongs here April 19, was made the favorite for today's race.
