

DISCOVERY OF CRATER LAKE TO BE CELEBRATED

The seventy-fifth anniversary of the discovery of Crater Lake by J. W. Hillman and party of 19 other prospectors, will be elaborately observed some time this summer, under auspices of the National parks system. It was announced today by Superintendent C. G. Thomson of Crater National park. This will be the first celebration of the kind. Crater Lake's history, although there has been mild agitation for years, throughout the state, to have the discovery anniversary date fittingly recognized.

Beyond stating that "we are now at work on outlining a fitting celebration program, one feature of which will be the re-naming of Glacier peak on the park rim 'Hillman Peak' in honor of the leader of the band of discoverers," Colonel Thomson has no further details to be given out at present. Glacier peak is located near where the discoverers first looked upon Crater lake.

The official discovery explanation, as published in the annual Crater National Park booklet, is as follows:

"This lake was not discovered until 1853. Eleven Californians had undertaken once more the search for the famous, perhaps fabulous, Lost Cabin mine. For many years parties had been searching the Cascades; again they had come into the Klamath region. With all their secrecy, their object became known, and a party of Oregonians was hastily organized to stalk them and share their find. The Californians discovered the pursuit and divided their party. The Oregonians did the same. It became a game of hide and seek. When provisions were nearly exhausted and many of both parties had deserted, they joined forces.

"Suddenly we came in sight of water, writes J. W. Hillman, then the leader of the combined party. 'We were much surprised, as we did not expect to see any lakes and did not know but that we had come in sight of and close to Klamath Lake. Not until my mule stopped within a few feet of the rim of Crater Lake, did I look down, and if I had been riding a blind mule I firmly believe I would have ridden over the edge to death.'

"It is interesting that the discoverers quarreled on the choice of a name, dividing between Mysterious Lake and Deep Blue Lake. The advocates of Deep Blue Lake won the vote, but in 1869, a visiting party from Jacksonville named it Crater Lake, and this, by natural right, became its title."

ITALIA FINISHES 1200 MILE TRIP WITHOUT HITCH

VADSOE, Norway, May 4.—(AP)—The dirigible Italia landed here safely at 9:10 o'clock this morning from Stolp, Germany, more than 1150 miles away. The Italia was first seen above the Varanger mountains, pulsing rapidly toward Vadsoe. The giant dirigible circled twice over the town, flying so low as to appear about to land. It rose again, however, and made for the tall mooring mast on the outskirts.

Shortly after nine o'clock, part of the gas in the bag was discharged and the mooring to the mast completed without a hitch. Weather conditions this morning showed clouds with a little wind, which it was believed, however, would clear the skies gradually.

This little city—with a bare 2000 population—one of the two or three northernmost towns in the world, was early bedecked in flags and bunting in honor of the visiting airman.

The airship will be refueled here before it carries General Umberto Nobile and his expedition to King's Bay, Spitzbergen, for another conquest of the Arctic wastes.

The flight was begun at Stolp at 3:20 a. m. yesterday. The crew of a government steamer and troops were called out at Vadsoe to assist in bringing the craft to earth. The weather was good with a light breeze.

Beautiful weather favored the expedition throughout.

CHINA AND JAPAN MAY WAR

Chinese navy office ordered warships to proceed to various ports along the Yangtze river and in south China today as a precaution against any anti-Japanese outbreaks such as have occurred in Tsinan Fu.

Four additional destroyers were ordered to Tientsin alone.

SHANGHAI, May 4.—(AP)—Reports from Tientsin say that Japanese armored trains laden with reinforcements have left Tientsin for Tsinan Fu.

Marshal Chang Tso-Lin, chief of the northern forces, is reported to have expressed his regret at the clash between the Japanese and the nationalists at Tsinan and to have offered to assist the Japanese with arms and ammunition.

This offer the Japanese declined with the explanation that they intended to suppress the outrage without help from other parties.

EXPECT McNARY BILL TO BE FIXED IN ABOUT WEEK

WASHINGTON, May 4.—(AP)—The senate today received the farm relief bill passed yesterday by the house and ordered it sent to conference for adjustment of differences between the senate and house.

The senate conferees are McNary, Oregon; Capper, Kansas; and Gooding, Idaho, republicans, and Smith, South Carolina and Ransdell, Louisiana, democrats.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—(AP)—A speedy settlement of differences in the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill, as passed by the senate and house, is expected by leaders in congress and the belief increased there today that the measure would be put up to President Coolidge with little delay.

The bill, as passed by the house last night, 204 to 121, does not differ sufficiently from that approved earlier in the session by the senate to cause farm leaders to forego any deadlock, but Senator McNary of Oregon, chairman of the senate farm relief committee, said today a conference undoubtedly would be necessary to compose the differences.

If the expectation that the conferees will have no difficulty in reaching an agreement is borne out, leaders believed the bill could be sent to the White House in about a week. There its fate is undetermined, but inasmuch as the measure still carries the equalization fee, to which Mr. Coolidge objected last year, a veto was predicted more freely than approval.

The senate passed the bill by a vote of 54 to 23, more than the two-thirds required to override a veto, but the house roll call did not show strength enough for such a move.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 4.—(AP)—A demand that each political convention write into its platform a plank committing it to enforcement of the eighteenth amendment and other amendments to the constitution and that only candidates favoring it be nominated was contained in a resolution unanimously adopted by the quadrennial conference of the Methodist Episcopal church here today.

The resolution, introduced by Ernest S. Cherrington, executive secretary of the Anti-Saloon League of America, provided for the appointment by the board of bishops of five of its own members as a committee to personally present the resolution to the platform committee of each party.

"The church," the resolution said, "will not be lulled into silence by evasive answers or vague promises from the major political parties."

C. C. Sleeman, president of Southern Methodist University, Texas, brought the conference delegates to their feet in an outburst of enthusiasm when he declared "The solid south is a memory. It emphatically will not support any presidential candidate who will not support prohibition."

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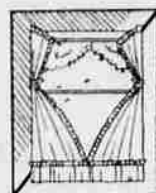
