WARM SUN MELTS APRIL SNOWS IN CRATER LAKE PARK

While no information has been received in Medford for several days past relative to weather conditions at Crater Lake national park, it is presumed that the warm weather of the past few days has begun to melt the deep tan of snow that fell at that high altitude during April.
According to the April weather report made on May 1st by John Mahon, winter caretaker of the lodge and representative there of the U. S. weather bureau and national parks service, while virtually every morning of the past winter and early spring fallen below corresponding months of last year, April surpassed the preceding months of this year in amount of precipitation.
Total precipitation during the month was 1.8 inches, against only 5.2 inches in April, 1927, the report shows. Snowfall during the past month totalled 42 inches, five inches less than April of last year.
The light snowfall of the winter however, is again revealed in the report on April which shows only 151 inches of snow on the ground May 1. There were 291 inches on the ground at the end of April, 1927. Last April was slightly warmer than the month just ended at Crater Lake.
