## NEW LAW FORCES MAN TO WORK



Under a new California law, Joseph Musso, of Richmond, Cal., a bricklayer, has been sentenced to one year of forced employment because of alleged failure to provide for his family. He is shown above with his wife and two children at the Contra Costa county hospital, where he is being paid \$2 a day, all of which goes to the support of his wife and children. Musso's refusal to work was the result of the attaching, by a brother-in-law, of his wages for a debt, which Musso declares had been paid.

## FILM STAR, FIANCEE IN PARIS



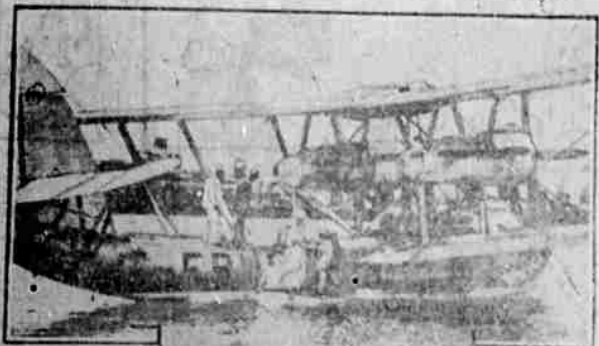

## TEMPORARY HALT IN WORLD TOUR



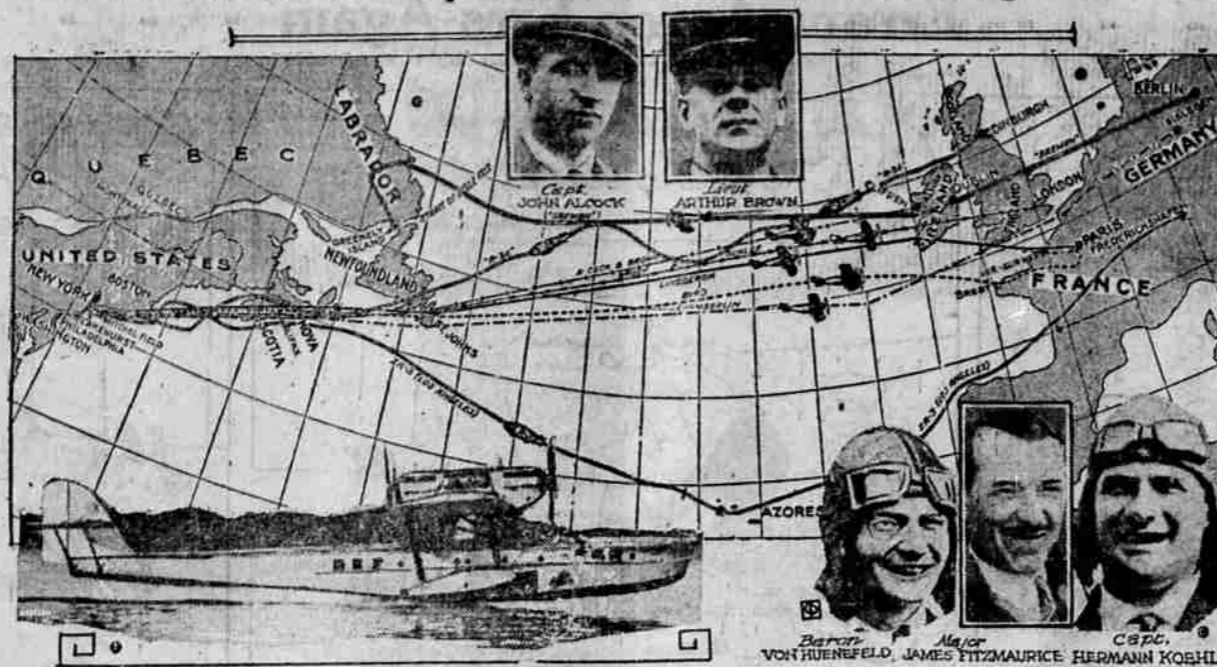

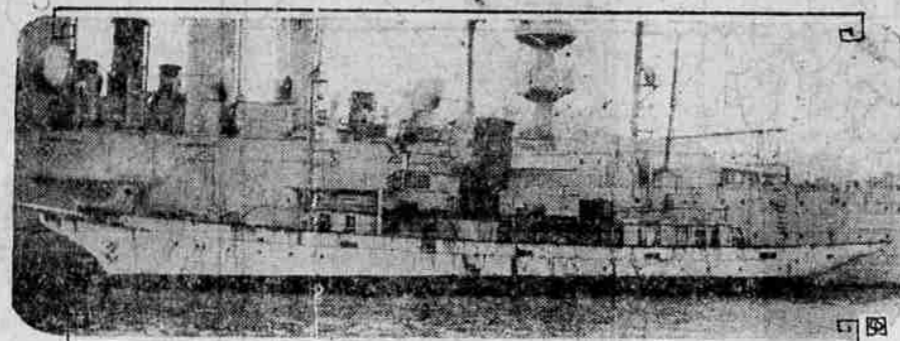
## How Man Has Conquered North Atlantic Through the Air

Map shows routes of pilots who have successfully bridged the North Atlantic. Above, Arthur W. Brown and John Alcock, who made the first eastbound crossing, in 1919, from Newfoundland to Clifden, Ireland, in 15 hours (still the record for speed) in a twin-motored plane of the bombing type, developed in England. Below, right, the first to make a non-stop westward flight, the three heroes of German plane Bremen (flying from Dublin, Ireland, to Greenly island, off Labrador), Captain Hermann Koehl, Baron von Huenefeld and Major James Fitzmaurice. Below, left, is a flying boat, said to be a prototype of the large flying boat of the future, being designed by German aeronautical engineers for ocean travel.

## FAMED NAVY YACHT TO PASS ON AUCTION BLOCK



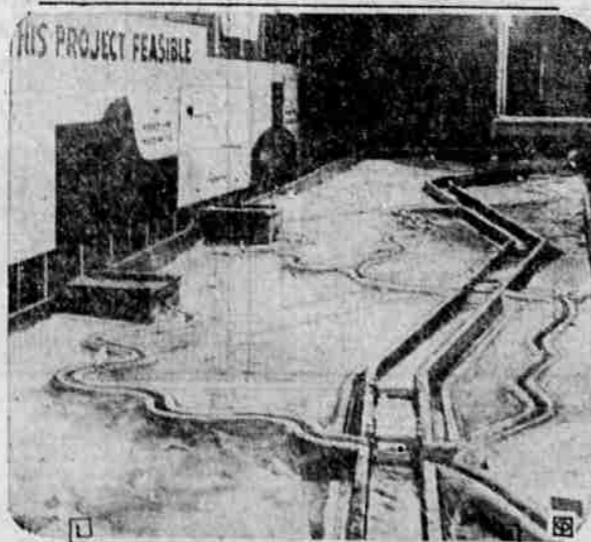
Converted during the World war to U. S. navy service, the U. S. S. Wenonah, Atlantic patrol ship, has sailed its last cruise for the government, and goes quietly out of navy existence May 15, when it is sold at auction at the Puget Sound navy yard, Bremerton, Wash. The little vessel twice was cited during the war for conspicuous service. Her war diary shows encounters with submarines, sinking ships and the rescue of survivors afloat in small craft. Before the war the Wenonah was a private yacht.

## DEFEND HILL IN MATRICIDE TRIAL

Butters, right, are defending Harry Hill, center, Streator, Ill., youth on trial at Ottawa, Ill., for a second time on a charge of slaying his mother, Mrs. Eliza Hill, wealthy Streator woman. Three of the four defendant lawyers in Hill's first trial, which resulted in a disagreement of the jury, withdrew from the case. A fourth, Lee O'Neil Brown, a former candidate for governor of the state, was drowned after the first case went to the jury.

## PREDICAMENT—HE LOVED TWINS



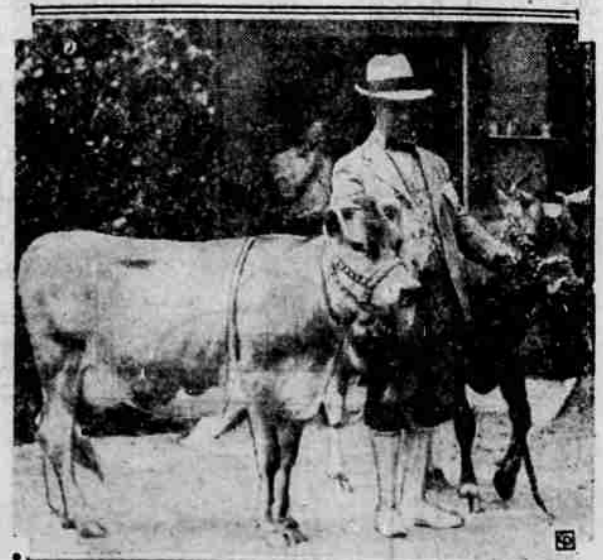
