GIVE THE SUPREME COURT A FEW BOXING LESSONS

WE hear considerable criticism of Chief Justice Hand of the State Supreme Court for taking a swing at Attorney Geo. W. Joseph in the Salem court room on Friday, following his obituary diatribe, that Joseph is a liar.

The local criticisms are general but not identical. Most of them condemn the Chief Justice for dragging the court room down to the level of the bar room and prize ring, while others do not condemn him for taking a swing, but do condemn him for not landing and sending the fire-eating Portland barrister down for the count of ten.

Well, there is some basis for the latter contention. If we are to have a pugilist for Chief Justice in this state, he should be a good one. When he starts a right hook, he should be able to come within at least three feet of finishing it.

If press reports are correct, however, Chief Justice Hand merely fanned the air, several feet from his objective, which so startled the redoubtable Mr. Joseph, however, that he fell over his own lawyer.

That doesn't make the Meier-Frank attorney look so good. A man who can fight as he does with his tongue, ought to be able to perform at least as good as a Boy Scout with his fists. One thing Boy Scouts never do is to fall down before they are hit.

So we feel that the professional attentions of Mr. Gene Tunney are sorely needed in the higher circles of the bar and judiciary of this state. As long as "trial by battle" has been revived here, sanctioned by members of the Supreme Court and the Portland bar, there should be some proper preparation for it.

Let Mr. Tunney take Chief Justice Hand and his associates on the Supreme Bench in hand at once, while Mr. Jack Dempsey can look after Joseph, Tom Mannix and other legal lights of the state metropolis.

Then, when we have an important trial, we may be assured of some action worth seeing,—instead of such a childishly amateurish performance as was put on in the Portland court room Friday.

Anything worth doing at all, is worth doing well. Come on, boys. Drop your law books and whereas, and go in for a little road work each morning, with shadow boxing from three to four, and bag punching before the curfew rings.

CAPITALIZING ON ROGUE RIVER

BEFORE local realtors Friday, William Isaacs, well known Medford merchant, touched on a point that has frequently been stressed in this column the past few years,—namely, the great asset we have in Rogue River, as a magnet to attract new residents from all parts of the country.

Rogue River is the center of the finest fishing and the greatest outdoor country left in the United States today. Without any advertising and without any special effort being made, a number of men of wealth have purchased sites along the river, where they plan to spend several months every year. In every case large tracts have been purchased, so any sort of congestion in this outdoor area is rendered improbable.

We agree with Mr. Isaacs that a more intensive effort, backed by proper organization, toward attracting sportsmen of means to this section of Southern Oregon, would be well worth the attention of the Realty Board and other civic organizations.

CLEMENCEAU SAYS FRANCE WON'T PAY WAR DEBT. TO U. S.

PARIS, France, May 5.—(AP) An interview with Georges Clemenceau, in the current issue of the weekly periodical Candide, quotes the former premier as saying: "We will never pay the debt to the United States) because it is impossible."

"The Tiger" said he had written a second letter on the debt question which he was ready to send out, but that friends persuaded him the time was not propitious and he would wait.

"When I wrote the first letter," he continued, "I feared that it would make friends over there angry, but not at all. They understood and continued their friendship."

"If only the French government were like them. If only it understood that we will never pay this debt because we cannot. But far from it."

"Why, had I been twenty-four hours late with the first letter, Premier Poincare would have signed (the debt agreement) and now what are they trying to do—abolish the Dawes plan. It is idiotic. But what do you expect when the government is filled with men without courage?"

CHARLES SCHWAB IS HONORED BY GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, Eng., May 5.—(AP) The Bessemer gold medal of the British Iron and Steel Institute was presented to Charles M. Schwab, chairman of the Bethlehem corporation, this morning.

"We of the steel business in America appreciate this association in addressing the institute. We like to feel that we are working alongside the steel industry of Great Britain, not merely in the making of steel but in promoting the progress and happiness of humanity. Through our endeavors in this industry we are the better able to understand the difficulties which each of us has to surmount and the processes which each of us has in view."

In presenting the medal, Benjamin Talbot, president of the honor institute, made the comment that it was the hall mark of outstanding technical ability and efficiency and was the highest honor in the iron and steel industry.

Mr. Schwab told interviewers afterward the bestowal of the medal was like a life dream come through.
