

PHOENIX WINS COUNTY TRACK MEET, TOWN DIVISION; EVANS TAKES RURAL SCHOOL HONORS

By defeating the school, which had been given the odds to win, the Phoenix school yesterday won the annual Jackson county field and track meet by a score of 214 to 176 for its nearest rival, Central Point, which was generally expected to make a better showing.

Over 200 school students took part in the day's events, representing 26 rural and town school districts in all parts of the county. The program was followed without a hitch, casting considerable credit on H. R. Finch, County School Superintendent Suzanne Homes Carter and Miss Elizabeth Buhh, who were principally in charge of the meet.

PENALIZED RACER SET 101 YARDS IN RECORD TIME

SELMA, Cal., May 5.—(AP)—Frank Lombardi, a nineteen-year-old high school boy ran 101 yards today in a 3-5 seconds to equal the recognized world's 100-yard dash record and become the outstanding figure in a meet filled with nerve tingling finishes and stunning performances.

With his brilliant effort, the lithe-limbed athlete from Los Angeles high school engraved his name in bold letters alongside those few who have traveled the century in that time since the first mark was established in 1906. Lombardi's smashing race overshadowed all other events of the California interscholastic federation track and field meet that saw six state records toppled. He actually ran 101 yards because of a yard penalty for breaking the gun and his time. Clocked by seven officials, is considered astounding as any ever hung up by an athlete of the west. A recheck of the timers' revealed that six were snapped at 9 3-5 seconds—the seventh showed about 9 7-10.
