STATE TO ASK A CHANGE OF VENUE IN CHANEY TRIAL?

A special session of the circuit court, will convene next Monday, May 14, and the regular term of the May court will be called Monday, May 23.

The special session will be devoted to the hearing of the trial of District Attorney Newton C. Chaney, indicted by the grand jury on 11 counts, for alleged larceny of public money, committing a part of the prohibition enforcement fund. The petit jury, now subject to call, will be drawn for the Chaney trial. The trial is expected to last three days.

The supreme court of the state has assigned Judge J. K. Skipworth of Lane county to hear the case. It is expected he will arrive in the city the last of the week to hear any and all motions, incidental to the trial, attorneys for either side may introduce. It is reported a change of venue will be asked by the state on the ground of prejudice in Jackson county.

There has been no definite decision as to the indictment upon which District Attorney Chaney will be tried, but it is presumed it will be the first indictment returned, which alleges the theft of \$319 from the prohibition enforcement fund.

The defense will be represented by Attorneys George M. Roberts and Porter J. Neff. The state will be represented by Special Prosecutors J. N. Johnson of Grants Pass and State Senator B. L. Eddy of Roseburg, father of the bill known as the "prohibition revolving fund," which is under fire in the indictments and trial.

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NATIONAL GUARD HERE REDUCED BY GOVERNMENT

Welcome news to the officers and men of Company A, 146th Infantry, the local National Guard unit, was received in the city today from the adjutant general's office at Salem to the effect that the strength of all of the National Guard units in Oregon had been reduced in accordance with war department orders, in order to meet the reduction in the federal appropriation for maintenance of the National Guard.

This means that the enlisted strength of Company A is reduced from 65 to 60 men, which leaves only five vacancies in the company, which must be filled prior to the command leaving at 6:30 p. m. on June 12th, to attend the Oregon National Guard encampment. These five enlistments must be made before May 15th, as no enlistments are permitted between that date and the time of the encampment.

Following the company's regular weekly drill tomorrow evening the command will march from the Armory to the Elks temple building, where its membership will enjoy an extra fine feed in the Elks club dining room.
