CODLING MOTH SPRAY NOTICE

Codling moths are emerging from the pupa stage and with evening temperatures such as occurred in the past few days eggs, no doubt, are being deposited.

Every apple and pear grower should have his first cover spray on by May 18, and then follow with a second cover spray ten days later.

On pears use three pounds of lead, dry material, to 100 gallons of water. On apples this amount should be increased to four pounds of dry arsenate of lead to 100 gallons of water.

Do not skip on the amount of dilute spray used but thoroughly drench your trees, and as a result you will obtain a higher per cent of clean fruit.

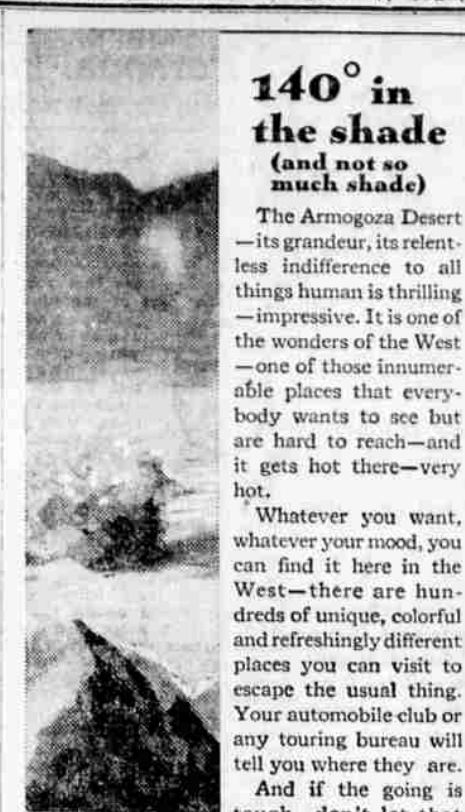
