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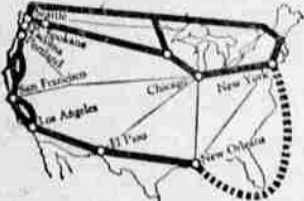
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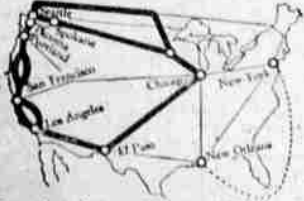

Mrs. Sadie Ore Dundar, secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, and Miss Glendora Blakeley, secretary of the state nursing bureau, will bring to this meeting their fund of health work enthusiasm and experience and will assist in the discussions of health work for Jackson county.
