audience who was waiting for her reply, she knew that at last the time had come to settle her account with fate.

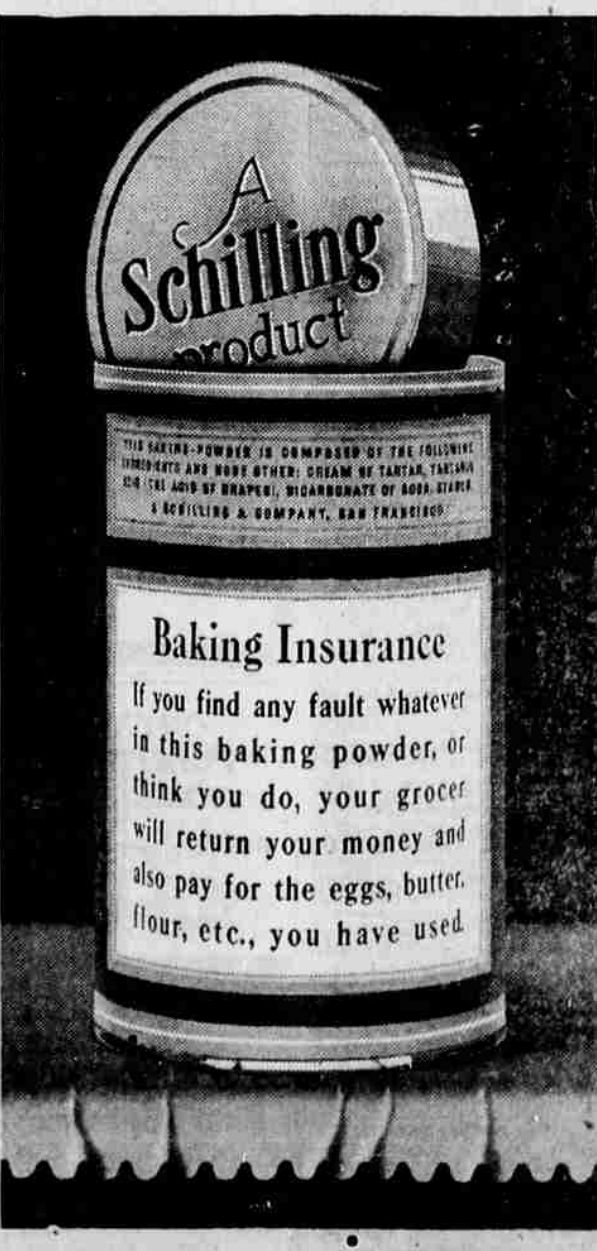
