

ASHLAND PAPER ENDORSES FAIR MILL TAX LEVY

At no time in the history of the Jackson county fair has the fair board been composed of a group of men more representative of Jackson county, business and agricultural interests equally identified, than at the present.

At no time has the prospect for a county fair which would be in truth a county fair—an exhibit of real value—competitive and educational—than at the present time.

Granges, organizations representative of the group most interested in the fair, have given the mill levy their unqualified endorsement.

The passage of the mill levy is necessary if the Jackson county fair is to continue—the near \$30,000 which would be derived from the levy will be devoted toward the completion of a building program which will make possible its continuation.

The facts are self-evident. The building program has been outlined. Insufficient accommodations have been made the conducting of the fair in the last few years an almost impossible task. Exhibitors will not exhibit unless there is sufficient space available for a real exhibit.

The exhibits become larger and more varied. A rabbit building is planned. The rabbit industry is becoming recognized as one of the leading industries of Jackson county. A machinery and auto exhibit pavilion is needed—machinery is an essential in modern life.

The money will be used exclusively for the county fair.

NOBILE REPAIRS ITALIA FOR HIS FLIGHT TO POLE

COPENHAGEN, May 9.—(AP)—The dirigible Italia was undergoing repairs at Kings Bay, Spitzbergen, today as General Umberto Nobile completed preparations to leave for the North Pole within a week.

One engine needed repair, as did the envelope which was torn at the bow when landing at Vadsø, Norway.

The ship has finished what in some ways was regarded as the most difficult part of the voyage, General Nobile said in a radio message to the National Tidende of Copenhagen.

Within a week we hope to do what has never been done before, explore a real air lane between this island and the North Pole," he continued. After announcing that the trip to Kings Bay had justified the faith of the explorers in the airship he added:

"The cross given by the Pope will be planted on the top of the world while we all kneel, thanking God."

MOVIE SERVANT TELLS TALES ON KENNETH HARLAN

LOS ANGELES, May 9.—(AP)—For three and a half years Paula Schultz watched other people play leading dramatic roles in film making while she took care of their bungalow quarters on the studio lot.

Then yesterday Paula Schultz temporarily took the center of the stage in a sensational divorce suit when she testified to having seen Mrs. Gertrude Virginia Henry, young wife of Albert Preston Henry, wealthy retired manufacturer of Detroit, in the bungalow of Kenneth Harlan, the film star.

Graphically, Mrs. Schultz, as a witness in the Henry divorce suit, told of seeing Mrs. Henry smoking and drinking in bungalow 113, Harlan's quarters on the Universal studio lot. She said she saw Mrs. Henry in the bungalow nearly every day for three or four weeks and told of the manufacturer's wife "hugging" the actor.

Despite what she had seen, Mrs. Schultz said she still thought Harlan to be a "nice man," even though "a lady's man." He reason for appearing to testify was that she thought "it was wrong for married women with children to drink."

As a result of her story, Harlan, who already has appeared as a witness in the case to deny he took a moonlight trip to Santa Catalina island with Mrs. Henry, will be recalled to the stand Friday, attorneys said.
