

WORLD PEACE LEADERS MEET



Listed among the speakers at the centennial meeting of the American Peace Society at Cleveland, O., May 7-11, are M. Paul Claudel, poet and French ambassador to the U. S.; Frederich Wilhelm von Prittwitz, German ambassador; Dr. Fridtjof Nansen, Arctic explorer, formerly Norwegian minister to the Court of St. James and one-time winner of the Nobel peace prize, and Sir Esme Howard, British ambassador. Representative Theodore Burton, of Ohio, president of the American Peace Society, is chairman of the world conference on international justice.

START DRIVE TO SECURE A RABBIT PLANT IN VALLEY

For the purpose of securing the erection and operation of a rabbit marketing plant in the city of Medford during the next few months, the Southern Oregon Mutual Rabbit Association is now engaged in getting the pledges of its members and other rabbit producers for a definite number of rabbits to be furnished to this plant beginning next September.

It will require not less than 2000 breeding does to breed the required number. It is desired to make a beginning next fall with a monthly turnover of 10 tons of rabbits, and it is estimated that this is entirely feasible with the present supply of does in the Rogue River valley. The plant is to be constructed by the American Rabbit Association, a company with headquarters in Los Angeles, Cal. This company is financed and organized to put the rabbit business on a paying basis for the producers. They are asking the producers to furnish a certain and secure basis for the continued operation of their plant, and to this end are asking the pledges of a schedule of monthly production from the producers. They are also asking for a sufficient sum to be used in aiding the construction of the plant, so that the local producers will have something at stake in the plant, and can consider it as something in which they have an interest. The amount asked for will not exceed \$1000 from the whole valley for the purpose of helping to construct the building, and the company is offering to buy for spot cash at prices based on the current market prices all the live rabbits that may be offered at the plant.

GENERAL LANE'S GRANDDAUGHTER MEDFORD VISITOR

Mrs. Annie Blanche Shelby of Portland, granddaughter of General Joseph Lane, historical character of southern Oregon, is in Medford and will attend the social gathering and card party Thursday afternoon to be held at St. Mark's Guild hall, given by the General Joseph Lane club of this city. The party is to replenish the fund for erecting a marker to the memory of the noted general, in the exact spot where he signed the peace treaty with the Rogue River Indians. Plans to have the children take part in the celebration accompanying the placing of the marker, was commented upon as being fitting by Mrs. Shelby, who recalls the great fondness with which her grandfather always regarded children. Mrs. G. Q. D'Albini, president of the General Joseph Lane club here, is actively engaged with plans for the celebration which is to take place in the near future.

DEMOCRATS TO OPPOSE THOMAS FOR JUDGESHIP

The democracy of Jackson is showing signs of life. Plans to do some writing on the subject at the primary election, May 15, for at least two judges. Frank Wortman is expected to run for the judgeship and said yesterday that he will support the matter under advisement. (W. Ashpole is being mentioned for county commissioner, and is securing a thousand head of stock to summer pasture in Klamath county, and is not taking an opinion on what candidates about entering the political arena. The democrats are making a search for another candidate to make up a full ticket, while the republicans are making a search for another candidate for the position of circuit judge of this district. I would have filed my declaration and entered the campaign for the nomination. However, after the time for filing had expired, many of my friends for on both sides came to me and asked me to become a candidate by writing in my name for that position. I told them that, if they desired to accomplish my writing in my name, and that, if the expression at the polls was such as to convict me that there was a general demand for my candidacy, I would qualify and make the race. I am informed now that Mr. Norton of Grants Pass is willing to accept the nomination. He is a good man and a good lawyer and, if he is really desirous of the nomination, I have no doubt that he has sufficient number of friends in the two counties to place him on the ballot by writing in his name.

U.S. FOREST SERVICE GIRL VISITS HERE

Miss Grace Carney, who has been with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. D. Carney, at Jacksonville near Central Point, and with her sister, Mrs. Marie Swartz, for San Francisco last Friday evening. Miss Carney came for this visit from Juneau, Alaska, on April 29. She had arranged to come to Seattle to Medford by air, but discovered to her sorrow that she was not a good flyer and was forced to abandon the plane at Portland after having covered the distance between Seattle and Portland in one hour and 20 minutes. Miss Carney, who is in the U. S. forest service, asked for a transfer to Alaska, agreeing to remain there for two years. That was the year 1925 ago. CITY SANITARY SERVICE BUYS HERD OF HOGS

Following the recent settlement of its injunction against Ray Spencer and W. H. Welty, two farmers who had been collecting garbage from local restaurants and hotel dining rooms, the City Sanitary Service is rapidly getting into normal operation, route collections being made daily. A permanent injunction was recently returned in circuit court restraining Spencer and Welty from making garbage collections from the Hotel Medford, Hotel Jackson, Hotel Holland, Pastime Pool Hall, Crater Lake Cafe, Crowson's Confectionery, Tom's Restaurant, Club Cafe, Ideal Cafe, Coffee Cup Cafe, Do-Drop-In Restaurant, J. N. Cafe, Jewell Cafe and all other Medford eating houses and also individuals. Taking advantage of this new supply of garbage, the City Sanitary Service has purchased a large number of hogs which will be fed at the city dump grounds on the eastern edge of Medford. Spencer and Welty, each of whom had a large number of hogs, dependent largely on the garbage for food, have disposed of them, according to reports.

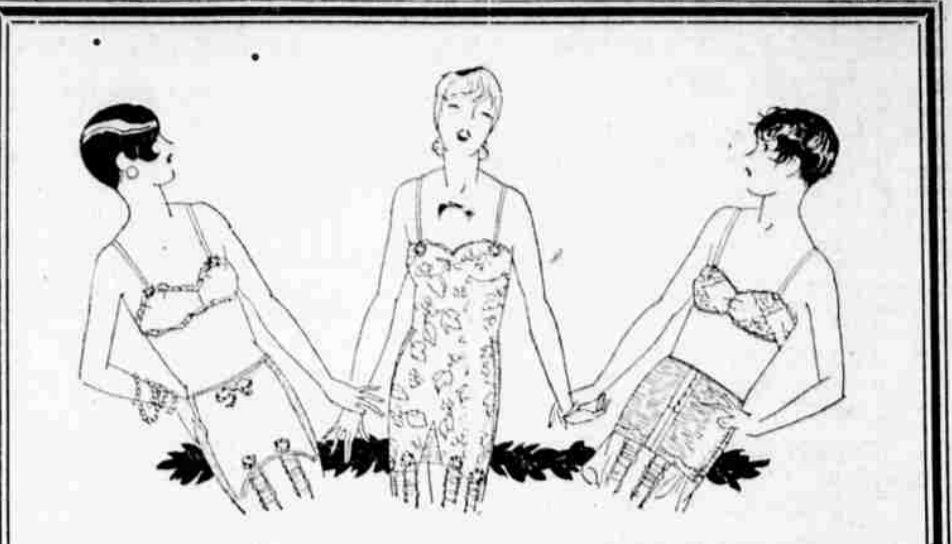

Local Strawberries In Portland Market at 2 Dollars Crate PORTLAND, Ore., May 9.—(AP)—Local strawberries were offered today in nominal quantities. Prices were about the same as for California Florin berries, which fetched \$2.25 for 12-pint crates and \$3.25 for 20-pint crates. Asparagus was lower at the opening, most sales bringing \$1.20 per bunch. Other commodities were about steady at yesterday's quotations. The county dressed meat market was decidedly firmer with hams selling at 19 cents. Most hogs, however, were at 18 to 18 1/2 cents. Pork continued heavy with hogs fetching 14 to 14 1/2 cents. Other classes of meats were unchanged. Except for a half cent rise in the quotation on extra eggs to 25 1/2 cents per dozen, butter and egg prices were steady today. Yesterday's receipts were heavy at 13,000 pounds of butter and 1467 cases of eggs. Storage holdings for night totaled 92,605 pounds of butter and 42,459 cases of eggs. 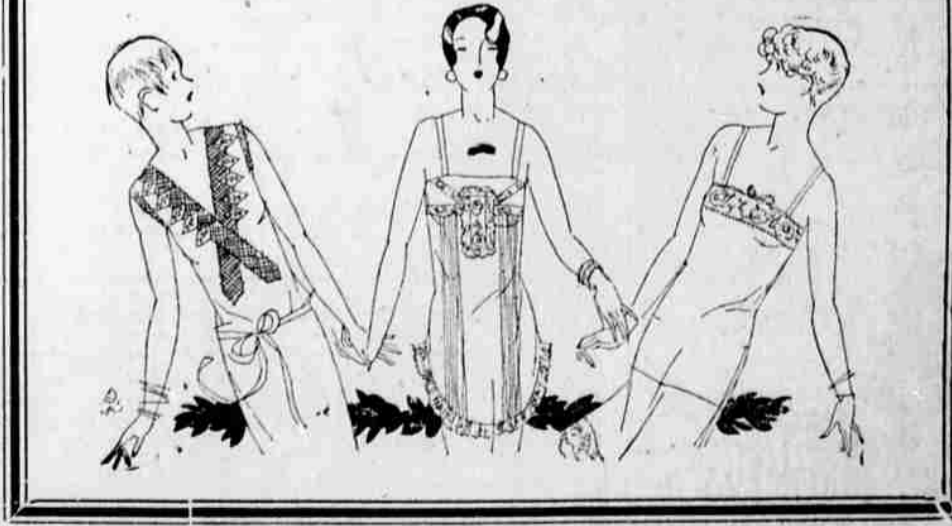
