NOT AS SENATOR WATSON EXPECTED

A FEW days ago Senator Watson predicted he would carry every district in Indiana, and sweep the state by a majority of over 100,000. Under normal conditions such a prediction would have been justified.

How this machine should have worked is clearly shown by the vote it gave Senator Robinson, who was opposed by two prominent Indiana lawyers, Solon J. Carter and Arthur Gilliom.

At the present writing, however, Senator Watson is only leading Secretary Hoover by 20,000, and while this majority may be increased, it cannot by any chance alter the fact that Mr. Hoover has run from 50,000 to 80,000 votes ahead of the anti-machine ticket.

In fact, as a practical matter, Secretary Hoover could have lost every delegate in Indiana, by an overwhelming vote, and still been a 100-to-1 shot to win at the Kansas City convention.

As it is he is about a 50-to-1 shot. With the nomination of Al Smith certain, the small group of influential Republican leaders, who could defeat Hoover or anyone else if they felt so inclined, will be in no frame of mind to do so.

In every primary election, including Indiana, Hoover has demonstrated beyond all question that he is that candidate. The Watson victory in Indiana means the opposition to Hoover by the professional politicians in his party who don't want him.

AS EVERYONE EXPECTED

THE exoneration of Chief Justice Rand, and the repudiation of Attorney George Joseph, his accuser, surprises no one acquainted with these two men, or familiar with the circumstances surrounding the controversy.

On the face of things, Justice Rand could scarcely be guilty of corruption when his decision was against the men who were supposed to have exerted the improper influence. But the facts of the case aside, to any fair person, familiar with the characters of these two men, the natural assumption at the outset would have been in favor of Justice Rand and against Attorney Joseph.

For Mr. Rand has a well deserved reputation for honesty and fair dealing. He is a very human person, but never has allowed his passions to overcome his reason.

Mr. Joseph, on the other hand, while a man of keen mind, and even brilliant attainments, has for years been notoriously a slave of his intemperate passions. Whether this is a temperamental or biological weakness, the fact remains that the Portland attorney has so allowed his personal hatreds to govern his actions that even his own personal friends have long ago refused to take his periodical outbursts seriously.

Mr. Joseph would rather fight than eat, and rather hate than fight. While his native abilities would have justified a record of distinguished achievement at the bar and in politics, this strange passion for venting his spleen has practically destroyed his usefulness in the public life of this state.

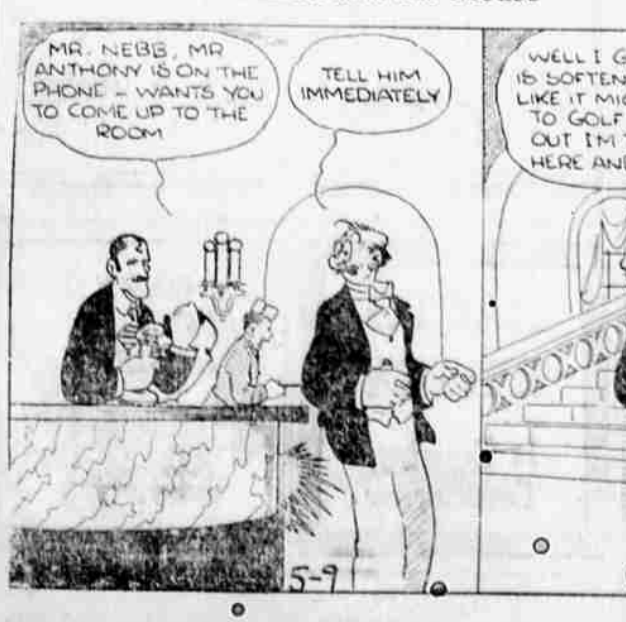

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, May 9.—(AP)—High money rates continued to cast a shadow over today's stock market, which drifted lower under heavy selling for both accounts.

Early declines ranged from one to nine points, but a partial recovery took place in the afternoon when a large supply of out-of-town funds, attracted by the 6 per cent call money renewal rate, began to make its appearance.

Trading showed a further contraction in volume, although the ticker was again unable to keep pace with the market.

The closing was firm. Leading carriers stocks again were in vigorous demand in the final hour.

Pittsburg and West Virginia and New York, Central and Southern Pacific were up 1/2 and Maryland and Washab 1/2. Earlier sharp losses in the airplane shares were more than recovered and American Bank Note gained 1/2 points.

Marine preferred, Johns-Manville, Woolworth and Lambert also displayed strength. Total sales approximated 4,000,000 shares.
