MARKETING OF BOSC PEAR TO BE INVESTIGATED

The distribution of Bosc pears from the Rogue River valley is to receive serious consideration this year. A committee of four fruit-growers—D. R. Wood, chairman; Harry Rosenberg, F. C. Kenly and S. M. Tuttle—have been at work some time collecting a mass of information relative to the marketing of this wonderful pear and some very interesting features have been developed.

Harry Rosenberg, on his way back from Europe called a meeting of the principal representatives of all fruit marketing organizations in New York and secured their cooperation in any plan that might be developed to broaden the present Bosc market.

The average Bosc grower of the Rogue River valley will be surprised to learn that in 1927 over 80 per cent of the total Bosc crop

raised in this valley was sold in New York City. This is altogether too large a percentage and in the near future the Bosc committee hopes to present a plan whereby this excellent pear can be brought to the attention of the trade in large centers throughout the United States, where at present it is practically unknown.

A recent inventory of pear trees in Jackson county shows a total of 115,231 Bosc trees as against 110,922 Bartlett trees. Even more significant is the number of young Bosc trees between the ages of one to eight years against the number of Bartlett trees of similar ages the Bosc total being 37,352 against 14,943 Bartletts. It requires no stretch of the imagination to picture what the total Bosc crop will be in a few years.

In 1927 there were shipped from the Rogue River valley 1310 cars of Bartletts and 462 cars of Bosc. With a total planting of Bosc trees now in excess of the Bartletts the present move to exploit new markets should be indorsed by every fruitgrower in Jackson county.

Watch the newspapers for additional information, as it is the intention of the committee to keep the fruitgrowers advised of their movements.
