CHANEY WILL BE TRIED ON FIRST ABOUT WEATHER \$300 INDICTMENT THE PAST MONTH

It has been agreed between the special prosecutors for the state, and the attorneys for the defense, that District Attorney Newton C. Chaney will be brought to trial next Monday morning upon the indictment alleging larceny of public money, which specifies the amount as \$300. This is the first of the eleven indictments returned against him, charging larceny from the prohibition enforcement fund.

The trial will start Monday morning at ten o'clock, with Circuit Judge J. K. Skipworth of Lane county on the bench. The jury, the regular panel, has been instructed to report at 9:30 o'clock. Judge Skipworth, assigned to the case by the state supreme court, is expected to arrive Saturday and hear any motion that may be advanced by either side. The trial is expected to last three days.

The state will be represented by Attorney J. N. Johnson of Grants Pass and State Senator B. L. Eldy of Roseburg, named as special prosecutors by the court. Among the witnesses slated to testify for the state are Luke S. May of Seattle, Wash., and Robert L. Craddock of Portland, Ore., handwriting experts, and several undercover agents of the state prohibition force.

CHORUS OF SCHOOL CHILDREN TO BE BIG MUSICAL FEATURE

During the state convention of the Oregon Music Teachers federation, which is to be held in Medford on May 21 and 22, there will be an opportunity to hear a chorus of 150 to 200 voices, which have been chosen from the Jackson county and Rogue River valley schools. This is the first attempt to bring these schools together. The choruses will sing a group of six two-part songs, which were chosen by a committee of music teachers, and include songs which are ordinarily taught in the classrooms of the fourth, fifth and sixth grades. The chorus will be directed by Miss Leona Marsters of the Ashland Normal school.

It is through the combined efforts of the music teachers in the towns participating and the cooperation of Miss Marsters and Mrs. Susanne Homes Carter, county superintendent of schools, that the chorus has been made possible. Miss Marsters and Mrs. Carter have visited the county schools at various times during the past few weeks and find both teachers and students extremely enthusiastic over this combined musical effort.

The Medford fourth, fifth and sixth grades will furnish between 75 and 100 voices for the chorus. The material has been given as classroom work, and the voices chosen will come from the four grade schools of the city. The other schools participating are Nell Creek, Reese Creek, Mt. Pitt, Rogue River, Gold Hill, Phoenix, Fern Valley, Howard, Oak Grove, Butte Falls, Griffin Creek, Eagle Point, Ashland Training school.

There will be a rehearsal on Monday, May 21st, at the Parish house. The chorus will appear at 2:30 p. m. the same afternoon.
