HOOVER AND THE FARM PROBLEM

IN A few days the McNary-Haugen bill comes up for the President's signature, and he is expected to veto it, as he did once before, and as he should.

For this measure, containing the price-fixing and equalization fee provisions, is not only economically unsound, but if it should be passed would create a precedent, most dangerous and demoralizing, in its consequences.

For obviously if it is right for the government to grant agriculture a subsidy, then it is right to grant any other business suffering from depression, a subsidy; and such a policy would simply reduce American business to the confusion of a mad house.

The farm problem is a real problem. The American farmer has not participated in the general prosperity this country has enjoyed, and conditions will not be satisfactory until he does participate.

But granting him a subsidy will not cure his ills, any more than scraping a victim's skin would cure a case of smallpox. The trouble lies deeper than in mere absence of profits; it lies in some fundamental defect in our economic and industrial system.

The proper way out is to determine the exciting causes of this condition and then correct them, and this is a job not for the federal treasury, but for the best intelligence this country has, directed to a solution of this problem alone, and reinforced by scientific research, and the application of the most enlightened methods of business administration.

There is no man in the country better qualified to head such a movement than Mr. Hoover, and while, during the excitement and emotional fever of a presidential campaign, this fact probably cannot be "put over" with any success; the fact remains that the best way for the American farmer to gain the material prosperity and stability he desires and deserves, would be for him to support the leading candidate of the Republican party, instead of opposing him.

The pulpit is occupied today by a college girl who didn't know she was preaching a fine health sermon. Dear Dr. Brady: I have long intended to write and tell you of the outcome of some of your teaching and now I am going to take the time from calculus to make my report.

To begin with (as they all do) I read your columns regularly and glean wisdom from it. I haven't worn a hat in six years, except on heavy occasions, as on our school trip to Washington when they wouldn't let me out of the hotel without one. Even then, it was in my hands most of the time. I wear as little clothing as possible at all times.

I have to have two, and usually get three hours of brisk basketball practice twice a week, tennis in summer, one swimming lesson a week, my hike to the train every morning, and skating whenever in college; I believe it helps me to study and think more clearly. I feel stuffy if I do not get all my regular exercise every day.

In winter I eat a breakfast of a big dish of prepared cereal and fruit, and in summer substitute a cooked cereal. I do not take coffee. I drink water at all times and lots of it. I carry my lunch, and everyone kids me on its size. In our family dinner is the hot meal of the day, so I finish the day with a hunky portion of balanced food.

For the last six months, following your teaching, I have used no physics, and I find my excretory process is carried on better than before, three times a day regularly. Perhaps you won't believe me in this and I wear overalls only when the snow is knee deep. I have a 15-minute walk to the station every morning and it bothers me not at all if my stockings are wet above the knees when I begin my half hour ride to college. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Dairy By-Products. Is cottage cheese considered to be fattening? Is what they call Bulgarian buttermilk fattening? Is it just the same as common country buttermilk?—H. L.

Answer:—I suppose some people suppose cottage, curd, or dairy, is supposed to be fattening. Cheese is one of the most nutritious foods money will buy, and one of the best, any variety of cheese. I do not think anyone will grow too fat from eating cheese. Bulgarian sour milk is either whole milk or skimmed milk fermented (sour) by the addition of a culture of Bulgarian lactic bacilli. In my opinion this beverage is no more nor less wholesome or healthful than ordinary buttermilk. I consider the more recent Acidophila bacilli culture, try more healthful than the older Bulgarian preparation. All of these dairy by-products are excellent and economical food. Most people do
