JESS SWEETZER PLANS COMEBACK IN GOLF HONORS

NEW YORK, May 10.—(AP)—Jess Sweetzer, former amateur golf champion of the United States and the only native-born American who has won the amateur championship of Great Britain, is a product of eastern golf.

In the south and west he was a baseball player. "I have played golf since I was about 12 years old," said Sweetzer, "but never gave much serious attention to the game until I came east to live. In Kentucky, where I was born, I played baseball and at St. Louis, my next residence I still liked baseball more than golf."

"What position did you play in baseball?" Jess was asked. "Pitcher and catcher."

It was suggested that the combination was a bit unusual. "Well, you see, the golf stay explained, 'my older brother was a pitcher, too, and when I played with his gang, he invoked the seniority rule and forced me to catch. When he was not in the game I pitched.'"

The specialization in golf began almost immediately, for in 1920 Sweetzer won the intercollegiate championships for Yale. In 1921 he again moved on to the third round in the amateur where he ran into Chick Evans, and thereafter joined the gallery for the rest of the championship.

Jess is one month younger than Bobby Jones, but he beat the great Atlanta golfer to a national title by winning the amateur in 1922. Bobby did not start his string of successes until the next year.

All the Kentuckian had to do was dispose of Willie Hunter, former British amateur champion, Jesse Guilford, defending titleholder, Bobby Jones himself and Chick Evans, who six years before had held both open and amateur titles.

Sweetzer came within a hair's breadth of repeating, for in 1923 he went along with Max Hurlston to the 28th green in the finals, where the fifth stroke of the match laid him low and gave the title to the Philadelphia star.

His greatest golfing triumph was the capture of the British amateur in 1926. Not only did he have to defeat Benwick, Oimont, MacCormack, Cave, Scott and Brownlow, but he had to fight against influenza and a strained knee all the way and an injured wrist from the semi-final to the end.

This was also a costly triumph for Sweetzer. He paid for it with a year's absence from the game and some anxious moments for his health. He found the cold, followed by influenza, hard to shake off and he returned home a very sick man. As a result of his long illness, he played no important golf last year, but by watching his step and spending many months in the south, he is fit again and ready for an ambitious comeback campaign this year.

Jess expects to play on the Walker cup team at Chicago, enter the gold medal tournament at Newport and try to win the amateur title again at Biscayne.

"I would like to play in the open, too," said the big fellow with the pleasant smile, "and it's not my health keeps me out. It's business. I can't spare the time."

Jess is a broker and is very busy every day but Sunday from the opening to the close of the stock exchange.

KARASICK VICTOR OVER JAPANESE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10.—(AP)—Al Karasick disposed of T. Higami in their light-heavyweight wrestling match last night, after 30 minutes, 28 seconds of wrestling, when he dumped Higami with a series of flying headlocks.

Warner took the first fall with a head scissor and arm bar in 27 minutes, 30 seconds. Wiles evened the count 26 minutes, 40 seconds later when he pinned Warner with a full body hold.

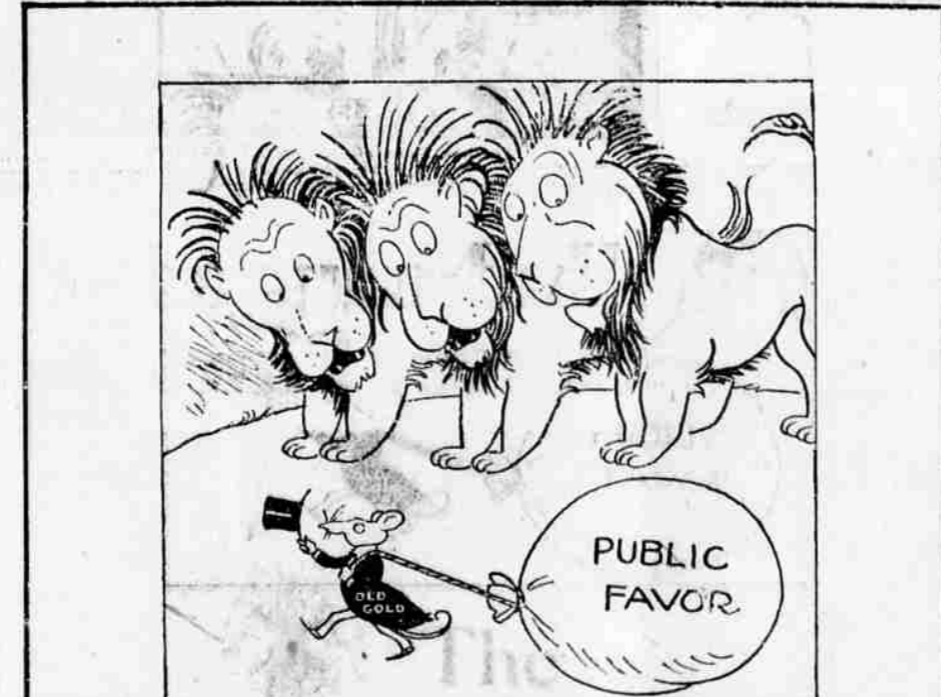
