Among the flood of new productions, superlatives, would-be epics and the like that have appeared on the screen this season, "My Best Girl," Mark Pickford's new comedy romance of the 5 and 10-cent stores, comes as a welcome relief.

The picture, which opened to an enthusiastic audience yesterday at Hunt's Craterian, can best be described by that bromide adjective, "delightful," in the fullest sense of the word. "My Best Girl" makes no attempt at pretentiousness, nor at imposing

It is, despite the pathos of some of the later scenes, by far the funniest production of Miss Pickford's career, and confirms her already high rank as a comedienne. 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EASTBOUND JAP. GIRDLER WINS

TOKYO, May 11.—(AP)—Toshiba Araki today was credited with having made a trip around the world, using existing means of communication, including aircraft, where commercial lines were in operation, in 33 days, 16 hours, 26 minutes.

Araki, eastbound competitor in the race, started by the newspaper ship Shimpou, completed his trip yesterday, while his westward bound competitor, Ryukichi Matsui, was sailing from San Francisco on the steamship Tenyo Maru for Tokyo, which he left a few days later than his rival.

Prizes of \$1500 and \$500 were posted by the Jiji shimpou for the finishing of the race within 40 days.

Amendment No. 1 to Quarantine Order No. 4, Pertaining to the Cherry Fruit Fly.
(Amending Regulations 1, 2 and 3.)
The fact has been determined by the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, under the authority conferred by section 2, chapter 246, General Laws of Oregon, 1915, and section 4, chapter 342, General Laws of Oregon, 1915, that it is necessary, in order to protect the cherry industry of Josephine, Jackson and Curry counties, do hereby amend regulations 1, 2 and 3 of quarantine order No. 4, to read as follows:

1. Fresh cherries shall not be carried or transported from said infected territory at any time into the counties of Hood River, Wasco, Umatilla, Josephine, Jackson and Curry unless accompanied by a certificate signed by an inspector of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture stating that all of the cherries in said shipment were grown in, packed and shipped from a section free from the cherry fruit fly.

2. Log boxes and other boxes that have contained fresh cherries shall not be carried or transported into the counties of Hood River, Wasco, Umatilla, Josephine, Jackson and Curry from the said infected territory, except that such shipment be accompanied by a certificate signed by an inspector of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture stating that all of the boxes in said shipment were dipped in boiling water or subjected to five steam in a closed container for a period of three minutes, and that said boxes are free from all fruit, leaves and twigs of the cherry.

3. Nothing in this quarantine shall be construed to prohibit the transportation of fresh cherries in log boxes or other containers of fresh cherries intra-county in the quarantined area, or into such other counties of the state of Oregon not mentioned in this order, or through the counties of Hood River, Wasco, Umatilla, Josephine, Jackson and Curry.
