W. O. HEINRICH TO BE CHANEY'S STAR WITNESS

W. O. Heinrich of Berkeley, California, criminologist whose deductions in the Siskiyou tunnel train robbery and murders, resulted in the finger of guilt being pointed at the three DeAcremont brothers, now serving life sentences in the state prison at Salem, will be the chief witness for the defense in the trial of District Attorney Newton C. Chaney, which begins Monday morning.

District Attorney Chaney is charged in 11 indictments, with larceny of public money, from the prohibition enforcement fund, aggregating over \$3000.

Heinrich, according to Attorney George M. Roberts, will give expert handwriting testimony, tending to show that other hands than Chaney's placed signatures upon vouchers, upon which the grand jury returned its true bills. He has made a microscopic examination of the vouchers and signatures. The handwriting experts for the state will be Luke S. May of Seattle, Wash., and Robert Craddock, of the Portland police department.

Attorney Roberts said today that defense would be a complete denial of the charge, maintaining that District Attorney Chaney knew nothing of any alleged illegal action, that a considerable portion of the defense evidence would be documentary, and that the district attorney would take the stand in his own behalf.

Both Heinrich and May are nationally known for their work in famous criminal cases, and both are leaders in their professions.

The Chaney trial will start Monday morning at 10 o'clock, with Circuit Judge Shipworth of Lane county presiding.

HAL HOSS FOR SECRETARY STATE

The race for the nomination as secretary of state has definitely narrowed down to T. B. Handley, Multnomah county lawyer, and Hal Hoss, former secretary to the governor and for many years prominent in newspaper work.

Hoss moved into Portland last week and opened headquarters in the Imperial hotel, and commenced immediately on an active campaign. He has spoken before several women's organizations and political meetings, and is being endorsed

generally by law enforcement agencies and individuals interested in clean government. According to the political talk around the hotel lobbies and offices, Hoss has a tremendous advantage in Multnomah county because of his great strength out over the state.

Hoss is being promoted as a "business man for a business of peace" as the primary interest of every citizen of Oregon is to see that the office of secretary of state is maintained at a high standard of efficiency. —Adv.
