## KARASICK CANCELS KLAMATH MATCH. CHARGES RILE

Declaring that a news article published this morning branded him as a wrestler who always frames his matches, Karasick this forenoon wired Klamath Falls promoters and cancelled his match with Sailor Jack Wood. He gave no other reason for the action and said that he would leave Medford this evening for San Francisco to join his family.

Karasick was the center of a barrage of questions and accusations fired at him by P. C. Bigham, a member of the city boxing commission, this forenoon. Stanley Rogers and Sailor Jack Wood, with the two former men taking the leading part in the talk, which took place in front of the Grand hotel, Karasick offered to wrestle Rogers at a side bet of \$1000 but refused to accept Rogers' challenge to a private match to determine who is the best man.

The Russian declared that he had enough money to retire and that at the close of his Australian trip that he would retire to his \$15,000 home in Portland. He criticized the Portland boxing commission and indicated that boxing and wrestling were both in a bad way in Portland, leaving the impression that he did not care how many dates he canceled, inasmuch as he was leaving the country and that he would retire when he returned.

The next match to be staged here will be in two weeks when Bill Shaw of Salt Lake City, Utah, a 215-pound grappler, will meet Don Noland of Coos Bay at the Hilarity hall. This match is to be an elimination contest of the appearance of Ed (Strangler) Lewis here in June, according to Matchmaker Sailor Jack Wood. Sailor Jack left this afternoon for Klamath Falls and will probably meet some other wrestler for the main event match tonight.

## KARASICK GIVES REASON FOR NOT MEETING ROGERS

As a result of the refusal of Al Karasick of Portland, the Russian wrestler last night at the Hilarity hall pavilion with Stanley Rogers, local bone crushing Lithuanian, because Karasick thought the crowd was not large enough, all wrestlers who appear in local rings will from henceforth be required to sign a contract and post a cash forfeit for their appearance, according to a decision reached by the boxing commission last night.

Despite Karasick's refusal to wrestle, last night's card was of a highly satisfactory nature, inasmuch that a fast match was staged instead between Chet Wiles, the wrestling policeman of Portland, and Joe Sheridan of Los Angeles. The two men had wrestled for 20 minutes when Wiles finally pinned Sheridan's shoulders to the mat. However, up until that time, the wrestlers were on even terms, with the southern California grappler, who appeared to be Jewish, applying a number of painful and punishing holds on Wiles, who, after considerable effort each time broke them.

Wiles marked this forenoon that Sheridan was one of the fastest mat men he had ever met and praised his ability as a wrestler. Wiles in his police department work is an investigator of traffic accidents and fatalities and has been employed by the Portland police force for over eight years. He was for a time located as a state traffic officer in Jackson county and by some is remembered when he held that position here.

In last night's semi-windup, Tex Porter, up and coming 145 pound wrestler of this city, defeated Indian Jones of Chiloquin in 17 minutes with an arm bar. The boys were evenly matched and provided good entertainment for the fans present. Porter showed considerable improvement over his last appearance when he defeated Cecil Barrick of Grants Pass.

In a second preliminary, J. Marshall of Aberdeen, Wash., who boxed on the last fight card here, wrestled last night and defeated a young Roseburg wrestler in less than five minutes by applying a vicious headlock. A main event boxing event, won by Young Swope of Grants Pass.

Fans were puzzled last night over Karasick's disappointing action and wondered if the Russian was not a good enough sportsman to wrestle the local Lithuanian, who was anxious to go on with Karasick, who leaves next week for an extended tour of Australia. At any rate, Karasick has been barred from Medford and has made himself unpopular.

"I am very sorry that I disappointed the crowd last night," said Karasick this morning in explaining his action, "but it was impossible for me to go on when I had expected a substantial guarantee. I am not afraid of Rogers and I can safely say that I can throw him at any time. I threw him in Portland and I can do it any other place I want to at any time. I would have liked to have shown what I can do in the ring."

"I am going to wrestle in Klamath Falls tonight," he continued, "that is if the house is large enough. If it is small, I won't, for I don't have to wrestle for a reward to mouth living. I am leaving next Wednesday for Australia with my wife and little girl and will probably be gone for some time. I hope that the people of Medford will not judge me too harshly, for I did only what I could do under the circumstances."
