NEW P. HIGHWAY CUT-OFF GAINS POPULAR FAVOR

The movement recently started by a group of prominent business men of the city to have established a new branch of the Pacific state highway, extending straight south from the present highway at the foot of Blackwell hill through the east line of the Gore ranch to the

Jacksonville-Medford road, is fast gaining momentum as opposition to the movement appears to fade when the full purpose of the suggested change is understood.

Already the names of 500 persons, including the majority of the business men of the city, are signed to the petition.

At a meeting of the Medford Greater Highway association last night at the Hotel Medford there was an attendance of about 20 men and women, including a delegation of eight from Central Point, led by E. C. Faber, which came to oppose and went away in a more favorable mood when they understood that Central Point was not to be cut off the Pacific highway by the new plan, but that the present Pacific highway would remain as it is, and that the proposed

branch would open up a new territory back of Central Point which might eventually add 150 to 200 new families to the territory between there and the Medford-Jacksonville road.

After a full discussion of the matter, during which it was argued that the proposed change was utterly without any selfish purpose but was for the good of the whole county, a resolution suggested by W. H. Gore and supported by Bert Anderson prevailed that the association's committee obtain at least 500 signatures to the petition, which would then be presented by a delegation of the association to the state highway commission for action.

Emil Mohr is president of the association, and Fred L. Heath is secretary, and the association's

committee on procuring signatures and making surveys for the suggested branch between the foot of Blackwell hill and the new connection through Medford, consists of R. E. Harster, A. W. Pipes, Chas. A. Wang, Dr. E. B. Eberhard, Emil Mohr.

The movement originated when some of the leading business men recently learned that the state highway commission was having a survey made to build a new branch of the Pacific highway from Toledo to near the Owen-Oregon lumber mill, to parallel the Southern Pacific railroad, in order to avoid a number of curves, and also to relieve the congested travel condition on the present highway.

As there has been much dissatisfaction for years over the Pacific highway not showing tourists

the better part of the business and desirable residence districts of Medford, these business men saw a chance to have the new branch routed through a more presentable section of the city.
