MOTHER'S DAY GREAT OCCASION FOR ARMY BOYS

In speaking today of the observance of Mother's day by members of the United States army, Sergeant Grover Owen, local United States army recruiting officer, told of the arrangements that have been made whereby soldiers overseas may send radiograms to their loved ones, and told of the arrangements that have been made whereby the mothers may answer the messages by radio.

"All army mothers whose sons are overseas should this year receive radiograms next Sunday," Sergeant Owen said. "The government having gone to considerable expense to make this possible. They are the mothers who will not willingly see their son wearing the red carnation as his tribute of love. They are the mothers with sons off with far flung army forces in Panama, Alaska, Hawaiian Islands, China and on the Philippine Islands. Is it a pity? Nothing of the kind, for soldiers of the army pride themselves in not allowing an ocean to dim the happiness of mother loyalty and hundreds and thousands of mothers will tingle with joy next Sunday in receiving messages of love from sons far away.

"Within the army ranks," he continued, "it is no exaggeration to say that there is no other occasion—not even Christmas—when sweethearts and others must share in the soldier's fund of devotion which stirs the army man to such earnest worship, nor results in so much feverish but well-meant activity. Both to the soldier and his commanding officer, mother's day has become one of the army's red letter days."
