GOLD HILL NUGGETS

A mineral spring has been opened up back of the place owned by Mr. Fitzgerald just east of Gold Hill. The spring is similar to that known as the Holcomb spring, which was recently purchased by two Medford men. It is owned by Mr. Ferguson and as a suitable name he calls it the Ferguson mineral springs. It is just three-quarters of a mile from the Gold Hill to Crater Lake highway. The spring is situated in a shady gulch and is about three by four feet in size. Near the spring is an old tunnel which has in bygone years been abandoned. In this tunnel a quantity of the ore from which the mineral in the water is produced, can be found. A majority of the ore is coated with magnesia of a whitish color. The ore itself when examined looks like lime rock, except for the magnesia, which is recognized as being one of the minerals containing the most curative properties. For the resident or tourist who cares to stay at the spring any length of time Mr. Ferguson has erected several cabins and has improved the beauty of the location. 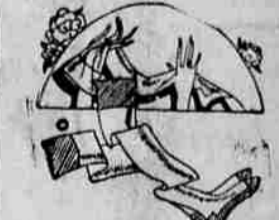
