HOOVER CARRIED INDIANAPOLIS

INDIANAPOLIS, May 12.—(AP)—Complete but unofficial figures tabulated on results of last Tuesday's primary today fixed United States Senator today fixed the majority over Herbert Hoover at 24,057, in the race for the republican presidential preference.

The vote from all of the 3610 precincts in the state gave Watson 227,524; Hoover, 203,477.

Complete figures disclosed that Hoover carried Marion county by 1592.

The capital city had been a battle ground between the two contestants.

UNLESS COOLIDGE RUNS, IT'S HOOVER

THE most important announcement, since Secretary Hoover threw his hat into the ring, was made yesterday by Secretary Mellon, when he told the Pennsylvania delegation that, while he does not favor an instructed delegation, he does prefer Hoover over any candidate now in the field.

Under the circumstances this was a most conservative statement for the conservative Andrew M. to make, for, with an un-instructed delegation decided upon, there was no occasion for him to mention any names, whatever.

Now, Mr. Mellon is to be the king-bee at that Kansas City convention. No candidate will be named over his opposition, and any candidate he chooses to name will promptly be awarded the cut-glass nut bowl.

What this Mellon announcement means is this: Unless by some improbable combination of circumstances, President Coolidge is forced to run for re-election, Mr. Herbert Hoover of California is going to be the Republican candidate for the Presidency of the United States.

In putting himself on record as preferring Hoover to Lowden, Curtis, Watson, et al, these men are, for all practical purposes, eliminated. For as Pennsylvania goes, so will go New York, and as these two states go, so will go the convention.

The Hoover supporters need not worry any more about Indiana or other state primaries. All they have to do is keep President Coolidge where he is regarding a third term. Unless the President changes his mind or is thrown into the race by a convention stampede, the victory they are after has already been won.

STEAM MANGLE EXPLODES; FOUR WOMEN KILLED

KOKOMO, Ind., May 12.—(AP)—Four women were killed, six persons were seriously injured and 15 others were suffering from shock and bruises as a result of an explosion of a flat work steam mangle in the Fridlin laundry here this morning.

The dead are: Anna Black, age 21; Emma Black Ford, sister of Anna; Bogella Courtney, Thelma May Garrist, age 29.

The women were working on the mangle when the blast occurred. The one-story brick laundry building was wrecked and window panes in buildings for two blocks surrounding the laundry, were blown out.

The mangle was situated in the center of the main room of the laundry, where about 25 women and girls were employed. The explosion tore out the front of the building and blew a large hole in the roof of the structure.

Many of the workers were badly scalded by the steam, which filled the room. Elmer Merrill, engineer at the laundry plant, could not account for the explosion. He said that he had just started to heat up the machine for the day's work and that there was only a pressure of about 70 pounds when the blast occurred. He said that the machine usually carried a pressure of from 85 to 90 pounds. The mangle, he said, was in good condition.

GREENLY RELIEF PLANES LAND

PORTLAND, Maine, May 12.—(AP)—The Greenly island-bound army planes took to the air from Portland harbor at 3:13 o'clock this afternoon, intending to make St. John, N. B., tonight, go on to St. George Sunday and Monday head from there to Greenly island. They refueled here.

Just before leaving, Major General Fochet received a telegram informing him that ice conditions were so bad at Greenly island that it would be impossible for him to land and advising him to abandon his flight there, but to use his own judgment. He said he would not attempt to land at the island but would drop the Junkers pilot, Melchior, by parachute, as already planned, and return to St. George, there to await Melchior's return with the Bremen.

KELLOGG OUTLAWRY OF WAR UPHELD

LONDON, May 12.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Chamberlain speaking in the house of commons today concerning the Kellogg outlawry of war proposal, said the British government not only warmly welcomed the initiative of the United States, but was hopeful that it would be successfully concluded and would make a real contribution to world peace.

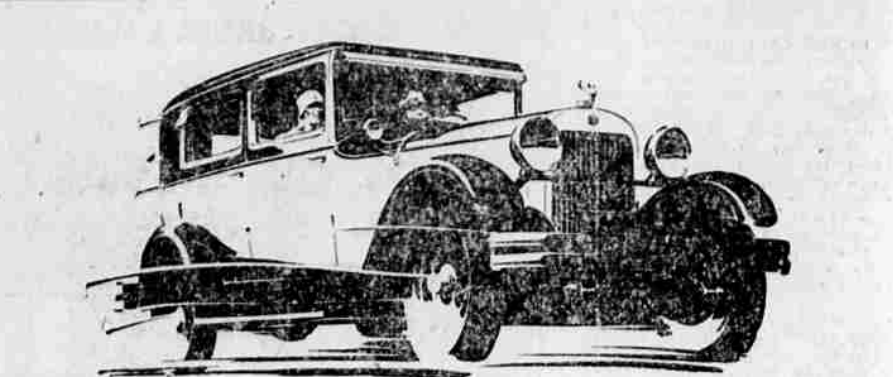
