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OREGON TRACKMEN SUFFER MASSACRE AT HUSKY HANDS

EUGENE, Ore., May 12.—(AP)—The University of Washington track team defeated the University of Oregon, 94 1/2 to 36 1/2, in a dual relay track and field meet on Hayward field here today, winning twelve of a possible fifteen first places and setting two new Pacific Northwest records.

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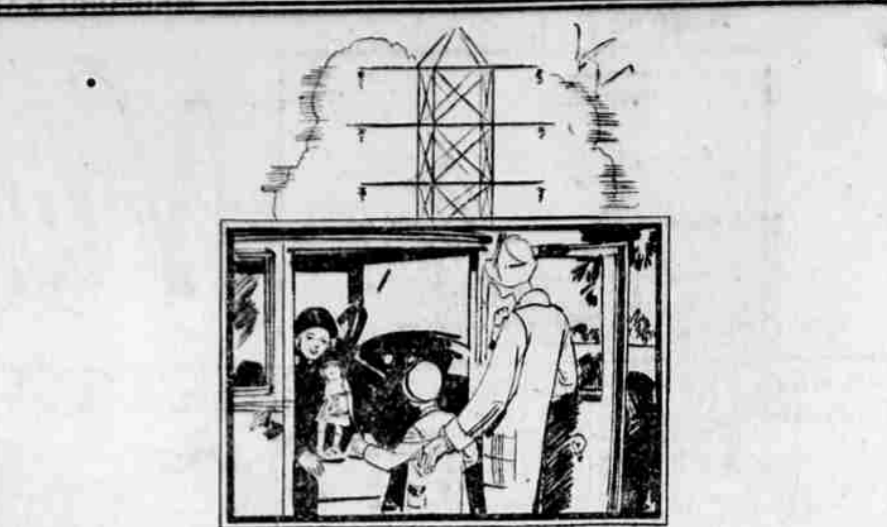
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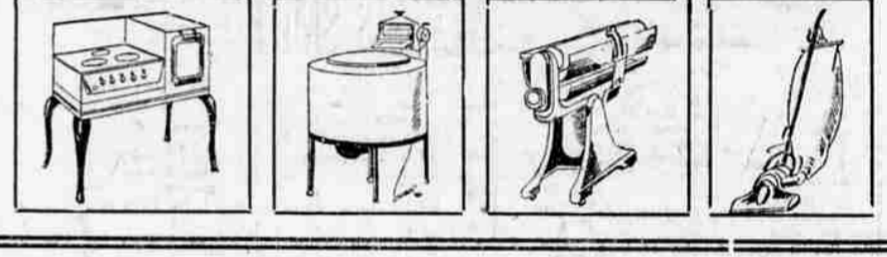

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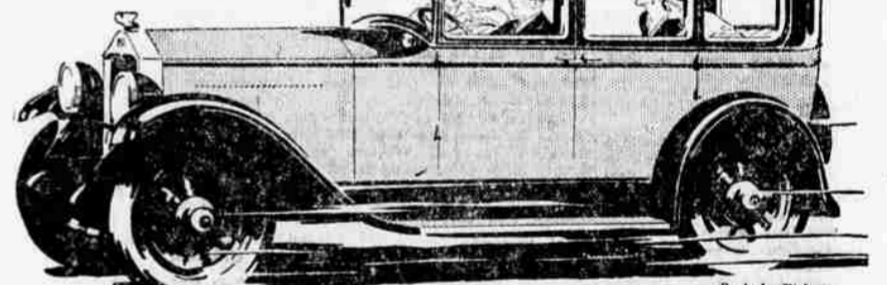
