TOO LATE TO BEAT HOOVER

CONSIDERING the fact that Herbert Hoover entered the race early, and for over three months has had a united organization against him, his progress toward the Republican nomination has been little short of sensational. Evidence brought out in the Senate inquiry the other day that the weekly magazine "Politics" has been financed by the anti-Hoover coalition, shows how energetic this opposition has been.

Supporters of Lowen, Watson, Dawes, and even Al Smith, apparently contributed to this magazine, and the managing editor admitted that the slogan behind the periodical was "Anything to beat Hoover." For any candidate, fought by members of both parties, to gain steadily in practically every state in the country, when left to struggle single-handed, certainly demonstrates a popular following and vote-getting ability unprecedented in our recent political history.

As we pointed out several months ago, if Hoover had been a more experienced politician, he would have kept more in the background, and allowed his popular support to grow, as it was certain to grow, until the psychological moment for an overwhelming offensive arrived.
