## Salem Ministers Endorse McMahan for Supreme Court

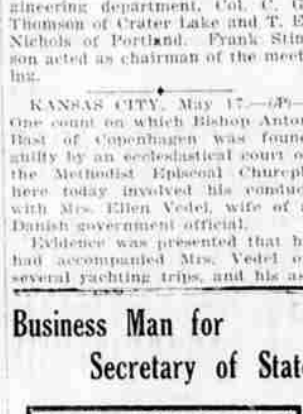
The Anti-Saloon League endorsed for the Supreme Court, Judge Rossman and Judge Hand and stated that it opposed Judge McMahan.

## Victor Bursell Asking Re-election On His Record

I am seeking re-election to the office of County Commissioner on my record, and I feel that I should set forth a history of the county's finances covering the time I have been a member of the County Court.

When I assumed office there was outstanding some \$155,000.00 general fund county warrants and the Pacific highway bonds of \$500,000.00 and the Crater Lake highway bonds of \$500,000.00 had been voted and were later issued.

There are no outstanding general fund county warrants, the bonds have been retired with the exception of some \$121,000.00, for which there is at this time funds on hand, but which cannot be retired owing to the splendid financial condition of the County the holders will not part with them before they mature.

It has been the practice of the County Court to purchase back the county bonds as fast as there was money on hand that could be used for this, and with every purchase of bonds the court has been able to effect a nice saving to the taxpayers up to this time when we have found that no further bonds can be purchased at a saving and I quote from a letter to our County Clerk from E. H. Rollins & Son, bond buyers of Portland, Oregon, written under date of March 19:
