Mrs. Colby has charge of the first four grades and Mrs. Kershaw the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades. Mrs. Colby's little folks put up a splendid exhibit of drawing, basket work, colored flowers and paper chains, while two little girls, Margaret Bates and Dorothy Smith, had their sewing club work all finished and on exhibition.

Mrs. D. H. Perry is leader of the girls' sewing club. Seven girls, Dorothy Smith, Margaret Bates, Harriet Short, Genevieve Stumbo, Marie Hiles, Frances and Elizabeth Perry are the members. Frances Perry, president, and Genevieve Stumbo, vice president. Each girl made a cushion, wall pocket, work bag, night dress and towel, hem-stitched and with embroidery initials on it. Girls from eight to 13 years did all this work. Mrs. Perry surely deserves the thanks of every mother on Foot's Creek for the help she is giving our girls. Mrs. Kershaw also gave as a prize for good behavior and industry, material for cone painting for the girls, and to the boys material for bronzing work. Clarence Harrison, Raymond Biles, Roland Miller and David Birdseye had a fine exhibit of bronzed work on bowls, vases and boxes, while Frances and Elizabeth Perry, Loretta Smith, Marie Hiles, Genevieve Stumbo, Michel Stum, and Harriet Short had lovely cone painted handkerchiefs on exhibit. We surely felt proud of the works these boys and girls are doing. The girls had also made lovely lilacs for decoration and many flowers were free hand drawing. Now let us all unite to help our teachers put on an even better school next year, and let us not fail to remember that a teacher who gives the best work barely starts to school work. NEW YORK, May 18.—(AP)—Rare wines, brandies and whiskies valued at \$50,000 were found aboard the Munson liner Munawar from Nassau today after government agents had smelled their way to the hiding place of 2500 bottles. John McAdams headed the group of three federal officers engaged in searching the Munawar by the usual methods. They discovered a strong odor of alcohol but there was nothing in sight to arouse suspicion except a trickle of water from the ship's aft tank. McAdams dipped his finger in the water and touched it to the tip of his tongue and found that it had a special flavoring suggestive of punch.

The tank was drained of about 80 feet of water and the agents discovered 412 hurlap bags on the bottom. The bags were filled with bottles containing an assortment of wines and spirits. Some ten bottles had broken during the trip.
