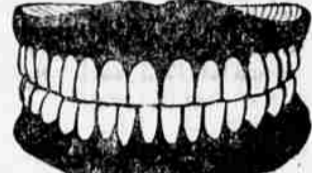

### OREGON EDITORS TO MEET IN MEDFORD AND CRATER LAKE

It has been decided that the meeting of the State Editorial association will be held in Medford and Crater Lake, June 29 and 30th, instead of at Albany as originally planned.

This meeting follows immediately after the California Editorial meeting at Medford and Crater Lake, June 25 to 28th inclusive.

The change in date of the Oregon newspaper meeting was definitely made today by Robert W. Sawyer of Bend, president, after an invitation had been extended by H. W. Price, manager of the Crater Lake lodge to give free entertainment at the lodge for the newspaper men from June 29 until after lunch July 1st, and after conferring with the vice presidents of whom S. S. Smith of this city is one.

Although Albany had made preparations to entertain the Oregon editors, the people of that city, with W. R. Cromie and W. L. Jackson, owners and editors of the Democrat-Herald, as spokesman, consented to the change with the understanding the association is to meet there next year.

The Medford and Oregon committee in charge of the entertainment of the California newspaper people will also arrange for the Oregon visitors which will, no doubt, include a golf tournament on Thursday, June 28, the day preceding the convention, and a reception on the evening of the 27th or 28th.

With several hundred newspaper men and their wives as visitors during the week, from California and Oregon, Medford and southern Oregon people will again show their world renowned hospitality.
